PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

District Council Election: Janet was elected with a majority of 66 - she polled 430 votes against my 364 votes. The turnout was over 50% which is very high for a local election and I'm sure Janet will join me in thanking everyone who took the trouble to register their vote. I think the size of my vote gives me a mandate, and possibly an obligation, to question some aspects of District Council policies and governance. I will be putting these questions to Janet, in future newsletters, and I'll give her sufficient advance notice to enable her to respond in the same issue.

New Councillor: Mrs. Rose Stevens of Hill Head joined the council, by co-option, at our May meeting. This brings our numbers up to seven members and our male/female ratio to 4/3. Any other ladies willing to join - to tip the balance? Bradwell - a model for Europe: I was invited to represent Bradwell at a stakeholder workshop in Bakewell on May 11th. Bradwell had been chosen to represent the UK - in a casestudy for road-testing a new European Union modelling tool. Two other communities, one in Germany and another in France are also being studied. Newcastle University are carrying out the UK research on behalf of the EU. Other delegates included officers from Derbyshire Dales and High Peak District Councils, Derbyshire County Council and Peak Park. The purpose of the project is to improve the quality of information available to those who develop policies, by taking more account of what happens in communities which are at the centre of local networks. Newcastle University first picked out the East Midlands region and then focused in on Bradwell as the centre of a ward network which most closely fitted their requirements. The network includes all the nearby communities for which Bradwell provides employment and services, and those on which Bradwell itself depends for services and employment. In the last scenario we were asked to consider a possible future change which might affect the balance of the network. As the Newburgh development had already been discussed, I suggested the theoretical possibility of the closure of Hope Works – should the proposed Lafarge/Tarmac merger go ahead. It was agreed to consider this as a possible exercise.

New recreational facilities: Now that the MUGA is completed and the Town Bottom Playing Field (TBPF) equipment in place, I would just like to express our appreciation for the efforts of Alan Slater and Jenny Lawson in bringing these projects to fruition. Alan was heavily involved in the planning and negotiations, with contractor Lightmain, for the TBPF works and acted as project manager for the duration of the MUGA works. Jenny, as chair of the PC Playing Fields committee, took the lead role in researching equipment and children's preferences, and determining the new layout of TBPF. There is still some surface work to be done on TBPF and we are considering some additional features. The old roundabout, which is the last survivor of the original equipment installed in

1931, is in storage pending a decision on possible refurbishment and installation as a fixed seat - but in a different location. We are also considering installing picnic tables, 5-a-side goal posts, and additional steps up the Assault Course near the Slide.

Carnival - Saturday July 30th: It's now on Facebook! The parade starts at 2.30pm and the theme for floats and fancy dress is 'HEROES' – to reflect the national appreciation for our armed forces. The carnival committee is hoping to have representatives from the forces in the parade and on the field. The street collections will be carried out jointly by the Teddy Bear Club and the Orchard Group – with proceeds going to benefit their own funds. Car-parking will be supervised by Bradwell Bowls Club - with fees collected going to the Club. Lafarge have again agreed to supply helium and balloons - which will be given out free to children on carnival day. The field opens at 12 noon and, amongst other attractions, there will be a bar; a climbing wall; the same children's entertainer; a stilt-walker; Malcolm's dogs and ducks; the Billarettes and St. John's Band confronting each other again and many stalls and other entertainments. Don't go away! Newburgh: At the suggestion of Peak Park officers, the PC has entered into ongoing discussions with Newburgh directors regarding their proposed development. Newburgh are saying that if their plan is refused by Peak Park, they will appeal and the decision could then be made at Government level. Our objective in these discussions is therefore to keep in touch with Newburgh's intentions and to maintain pressure on them to reduce the size of their proposals. Peak Park officers say that their recommendation will be influenced by residents' opinions – particularly those expressed in letters. But wait till the new planning application arrives before putting pen to paper.

Severn Trent: The parish clerk is to write to Severn Trent regarding reported problems with water supply to some dwellings and sewage disposal from some areas. Our question is -If Severn Trent's networks are inadequate for current purposes, how could they cope with any proposed Newburgh development? Chris Furness

BRADWELL 100 YEARS AGO

As part of the 'After Seth' Project Mary Bradwell made available to the Bradwell Historical Society a collection of newspaper cuttings made by her uncle Cyril Evans. The cuttings were taken from local newspapers between 1911 and 1951 and describe events in and around Bradwell throughout the period. There is no direct indication of which newspapers were involved, but many of the cuttings appear to come from papers such as the Derbyshire Times. The pages of the cuttings books have been photographed or scanned by the Society and have been stored in the form of picture files (jpeg files). The collection is divided up into folders with each folder containing all the cuttings for a particular year. Thus the Society has DVDs containing the images of all the cuttings, consisting of some 1200 files pages. In addition copies of the cuttings for some years have been printed. These may be viewed by arrangement with the Officers of the Bradwell Historical Society (see http://www.bradda.org for the names of the Officers). Because the collection began in 1911 it seemed appropriate to begin a series in the Bradwell News entitled 'Bradwell 100 Years Ago' drawing on the cuttings. For every year except 1911 the dates of the cuttings are carefully recorded but for the first year dates occur only occasionally. It seems that Cyril Evans began collecting sometime in the Spring of 1911 when much was being made of preparations for the Coronation of George V on 22nd June 1911. The first (extended) article in the cuttings is entitled 'Bradwell's Old Mines' and focuses on the recollections of Robert Evans who was then in his eighties and one of the few surviving Bradwell miners. There is a photograph of Robert who also appears in a photograph taken 40 years earlier, which can be seen on page 34 of 'Bradwell Ancient and Modern'. Robert describes how men, women and children were all engaged in working at the various aspects of lead mining. He also recalls other industries such as silk making in what are now Brook Buildings. Robert had married one of postman John 'Shaver' Middleton's daughters and they lived in the house on Town Gate that had been Bradwell's first Post Office. Another cutting records the departure for Saskatoon, Canada of Charles Bradwell on board the Empress of Britain sailing from Liverpool. The Bradwell Minstrel Troupe consisting of Messrs Croft, A. & N. Bradwell, Milhench, Tanfield, Morley, Beach and Wood performed concerts in Bradwell and Little Hucklow with Mr Croft astounding the audience as the 'Wizard of Bradwell'. A cutting from this time also shows the Bradwell Ladies Choir resplendent in their dresses and hats as performers (and prize winners) at that year's Buxton Music Festival. Mr Revel of Netherside and Mr A. Bradwell as guides led a party of 20 children from the Council School in a visit to Bagshawe Cavern and there is a vivid description of what they saw. This section of the cuttings culminates in an article entitled 'How We Celebrated the Coronation'. There were several marches (one shown as a frontispiece in *After Seth* and one by torchlight) and a fancy dress competition for which there were more than 100 entries. The names of the winners and runner's up in every category are included with a description of their dress. There is much to learn about family history and the history of Bradwell in these cuttings.

REBELLION KNOLL WI

There will be cakes and buns and a display on what we have done, and hope to achieve, this year so please come and join us. Further arrangements were also made for our tent on Beggars Plot during Gala Day (one little known fact - the bunting around our tent is all hand made!). We are busy clearing out the tubs on the main road (apologies for the poor display this spring, the inclement winter weather got the better of the bulbs) ready for their summer replanting and we have tackled the border leading into Town Bottom Playing Field. This will be replanted once our new Village Map is installed.

MRS MARY OLGA ILLINGWORTH



Olga Illingworth died on 12th April at the Hallamshire Hospital aged 97 years. Born in Bradwell, the only daughter of George and Eliza Bancroft, she was educated at Bradwell Council School and then at New Mills Grammar School. After leaving school she worked as a secretary at a steel works in Sheffield before moving to Cole Brothers as personal assistant to one of the Coles. In 1952 she moved

to the Derwent Valley Water Board at Bamford where she remained until 1959. She married Ronald Illingworth and they lived at Purley until Ronald's retirement, when they moved to Dore. After her brother's death she moved to Bradwell for a short while before returning to Sheffield. Olga enjoyed walking, going to the theatre, doing crosswords, reading poetry and music. She leaves stepsons John and Lewis. Her husband Ron and brother Clifford pre-deceased her. There was a funeral service at Bradwell Methodist Church, followed by cremation at Hutcliffe Wood on 29th April.

MRS HAZEL ANNE MIDDLETON

Anne Middleton died at the Hallamshire Hospital on 13th April aged 79 years. Born in Leek she was the youngest of the three children of Percy and Hilda Day. At the age of eighteen she married Vincent Middleton and came to live in Bradwell. They moved to Hathersage for a time, before returning to Rose Cottage (re-named Birch Trees) in Smalldale. She then moved to Lodge Moor, then to Leek following her divorce, and

finally to Sheffield to be nearer to her family. Anne enjoyed gardening, cooking, holidays abroad and coach holidays in this country. She leaves sons Tony, Julian, Nicholas and Matthew, daughters Jayne and Lynne, 13 grandchildren and exhusband, Vincent. A funeral service followed by burial took place at St Michael's Church, Hathersage on 27th April.

Gwendolen Chatburn died at Moorland House, Hathersage on 4th April aged 99 years. Born in Bradwell, the only child of George and Annie Thomas, she was educated at the Council School and then New Mills Grammar School. On leaving school she worked as a secretary for Sheffield firm until marrying Henry Chatburn, when she assisted him in his building business in Hope. She lived in Hope until moving to Moorland House. Her main interest was her family, but she also enjoyed foreign holidays and playing the piano. She leaves a son Axel, daughter Katrina, four grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren. Her husband pre-deceased her. Cremation was at Brimington, followed by a memorial service at Bradwell Methodist Church on 14th April.

MRS AUDREY WINIFRED WALKER
