AN IMPORTANT CALL TO BRADWELL

May 2003 was an important milestone in the history of Bradwell, because it marked the completion of the first village Plan. Developed over a period of almost two years the plan defined how residents wanted to see the village change, and every effort was made to ensure as many people as possible had their own wishes incorporated into the plan. Since that time it is good to see that a number of things defined in the plan have been achieved, for example:

- An all games area (the recently opened MUGA on the Sports Field)
- A village Newsletter (the Bradwell News of which this is edition 111)
- A village website
- A village map (one has just been installed)

In fact, there has been much progress with many of the things identified in the last plan. A group of people felt that now would be a good time to update the plan and gather village opinion regarding how they want Bradwell to develop during the next ten years. This is particularly important in light of the Government's planned "Localism" bill which will empower local communities to have more of a say in how their commu-

nity develops and grows.

A first meeting of the starter group has already taken place and it was felt **vital** that **everyone** in the village is given the opportunity to participate and contribute.

For this purpose there will be a **village meeting in the Memorial Hall at 7:30pm on Thursday 15th September**.

Everyone is invited to come along to hear the proposals, contribute thoughts and learn how they can participate. If you can't attend on that date but have something to say, please contact acting Chair lan Jarvis on 621425 or acting Secretary Liz Downing on 623941. It is most important that this new plan reflects the wishes of everyone in Bradwell so we can work together towards the future.

ST PETER'S CHURCH - HOPE

A collection of silver items, some dating back to the 17th century, has been stolen from St Peter's Church in Hope. The church was broken into during late July, and about 15 valuable items, made between 1662 and 1970 and used for special services, were taken from a safe. Church representatives said 'We are shocked and devastated that these items of historical, sentimental and sacramental interest have been stolen, but we are relieved that no-one was injured as a result of the theft'. 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PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Brian Nicols. Councillors were saddened to hear of Brian's death and we send our condolences to his family. Brian had been contracted as village caretaker for three years from January 2007 until the onset of his illness in March 2010. Paul has been fulfilling that role for his father since then.

Saturday Skip. As requested by the Council at our July meeting, the parish clerk, Steve Lawless, wrote to Derbyshire Dales District Council to complain about the loss of this valued part of their waste management policy. He stressed councillors' concerns about the increase in fly-tipping and garden fires which we fear will result from this decision and the extra costs to residents in disposing of large waste. Steve also complained about the lack of consultation. It was to no avail, since District, in their reply, are adamant that they will not reconsider or even delay the final date. They say that any large waste should be taken to the new recycling facility at Rowsley, where 60% of it can be recycled. Other parishes have complained and have received the same response. It seems the decision was made purely to save the £45000 per annum cost of the service, across the district, and no account was taken of the cost of removing the resulting fly-tipped rubbish, or the carbon footprints of extra garden fires and car journeys to Rowsley. DDDC are adamant that they will not reconsider or even put back the final date. They have not given parishes the option of funding these monthly collections out of the parish precept.

Multi Use Games Area (MUGA). The parish clerk reported to the August PC meeting that the application to reclaim the VAT payable on equipment and construction of the MUGA VAT has been accepted by H. M. Revenue and that a refund of approx. £21,200 has now been received. He also reported the receipt of a 'Thank You' card from Bradwell Sports Club for council assistance as the accountable body for facilitating the MUGA. The PC officially currently owns the equipment but the Sports Club are responsible for the costs of maintenance and repairs and for its insurance.

Carnival Committee. Councillor Vanessa Horstead's report, as chair of this committee, appears elsewhere in this newsletter and we thank her for all her efforts in making this year's event such a resounding success.

Village Plan. The request for an S137 grant of £400 from a village group wishing to produce an updated Village Plan was considered at our August meeting. Mr. Ian Jarvis spoke on behalf of the group and reported that it was now many years since the original Village Plan had been produced. He said that much of the work identified then had been completed, and that the plan now needed refreshing. It was resolved to contribute £400 from the S137 fund subject to the group being properly constituted, appointing a management committee and progressing the work proposed.

Speeding. Further to our request for a 30mph automatic illuminated speeding sign near Dale End, the clerk reported to

the August meeting that he heard from DCC Highways dept. that they are presently gathering further information on traffic movements on Church Street before coming to a decision. *Information*. The need to increase council communication with residents was discussed and it was agreed that the Clerk should investigate whether it might be possible to obtain another panel on the Memorial Hall notice board to display the Residents' Information Sheet. It was also agreed to produce and distribute a copy of the council Annual Report alongside a Bradwell News issue from next year. Chris Furness

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Pox, Pus and Privies in Victorian England Suzanne Bingham explained that as a citizen of Sheffield she had taken an interest in her city's three great disasters the cholera epidemic of 1832, the Great Flood of 1864 and the 1940 Blitz. The huge population changes that affected Sheffield in the 19th century, with a tenfold increase from about 31,000 to 335,000, all happened against a background of appalling housing conditions. Public services were fragmented with Police being responsible for cleaning and lighting; Town Trustees for drains and sewerage and the Poor Law Board for the removal of nuisances (including dead animals). Naturally these conditions led to a wide range of infectious diseases, but there was uncertainty as to cause because the idea of germs was not general until the 1870s. After an outbreak of cholera in Sunderland in 1831, Sheffield introduced health measures in an attempt to prevent an outbreak of the disease in the city. Free health treatment houses were set up, but people were suspicious of treatment houses which they regarded as 'places to die' and anyway the disease seemed to have passed Sheffield by. Then in August 1832 people in Sheffield began to die of what we now know to have been cholera. Treatments were ineffective and it was believed that early burial was essential to prevent the spread of the disease (with cases of premature burials!). The Duke of Devonshire provided ground for mass burial. After the outbreak a retrospective study of its causes looked at three main areas: housing, water supply and sewerage. The study showed that in one area 386 people had access to just two privies neither of which was usable. It seems that Sheffield had learned the lessons of the 1832 outbreak because when the disease raged once more in the country in 1848/9 Sheffield was relatively spared. But by 1860 with accelerated industrialization things had fallen back, with life expectancy between 17 and 33. It was clear that this was due to very high infant mortality and here again the finger pointed at living conditions. In 1875 a Public Health Act was signed, which led to attention being paid to proper sanitation with flushing toilets being introduced. The 1911 census showed that infant mortality was still high with whooping cough, measles and diarrhoea all killers of the young. Sheffield focused on maternal education and the provision of maternity leave and things slowly improved.

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PEAK FOREST ANGLING CLUB



The Peak Forest Angling Club celebrated its 150th anniversary on 1 July, making it one of the oldest fishing clubs in the region. The Peak Forest Angling Club has been fishing the River Noe and its tributary streams, Bradwell Brook and Peakshole Water, since 1861. The Club held a fishing event and evening celebration to mark the grand occasion. Club Chairman Vincent Middleton said: "I have always thought it a privilege to fish our river and be a member of such a fantastic club. To be Chairman at the time of our 150 year anniversary is an absolute honour." Members past and present enjoyed the fishing afternoon which started at 2 pm on Friday 1 July. They met at the Rising Sun Inn, Bamford, which hosted their evening celebratory meal. Brian Witten, the Peak Forest Angling Club's Secretary, said of the day: "This has been a very enjoyable social gathering for usually lonesome anglers. I am looking forward to the next 150 years!" At the meal that evening, Club Committee members including Mr Witten and Mr

Middleton toasted past and present members, as well as the local landowners who allow the Club to access the river via their land. Since its formation in July 1861, the Peak Forest Angling Club has grown from a group of four wealthy men to 40 members from all over Derbyshire, South Yorkshire and even further afield. In the 1860s, Queen Victoria granted the River and its lands to local landowner William Bagshawe, who leased the river and fishing rights to the Peak Forest Angling Club. The Club leased the fishing rights for many years and it was not until the late 1990s that the Peak Forest Angling Club purchased the majority of the fishing rights, the rest are leased from Geoff Eyre. Bradwell Brook is one of only three rivers in the United Kingdom where rainbow trout breed naturally. Honorary President Colin Jones said: "It's the best kept secret in Derbyshire, and probably the best wild fishery in the land." To also mark the occasion, a book was commissioned to capture the history of the Club, the River, and the surrounding land. The book was written by Lesley-Anne Card and will be on sale at various locations throughout Hope Valley.
