Village Caretaker

Gareth Storey has reluctantly tendered his resignation, because of other commitments, and we are therefore urgently seeking a replacement.

The work involves some maintenance and litter picking in both playing fields, the Peace Gardens and, behind the ice cream shop. Also tending flower tubs and strimming and tidying footoaths and Council owned land. It would be useful if applicants were also able to repair stone boundary walls and wooden public seats. Road Damage

O - Some of the roads in Bradwell are in appalling condition, and yet we have received none of the special funding recently reported in the Derbyshire Times. What is the Parish Council doing to get some of this money for our roads.

A - The special funding was for specific projects which had been identified by Highways as urgent, but not previously included their budget. I understand that it has all now been allocated

We are not privy to the mechanism by which these projects are selected nor are we consulted about the relative urgency of road improvements in Bradwell as compared to other parts of Derbyshire.

Over the past few years we have reported road damage to Highways on a regular basis and then pressed them to carry out the repairs. Some of their work has appeared to be of a temporary nature and has quickly deteriorated. We discussed this with them recently and it was agreed that if we would carry out a survey of the condition of all Bradwell roads, they would make the village a high priority and would arrange to do all the agreed repairs at the same time and to a satisfactory standard.

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Parish Councillors are currently completing this survey and it will shortly be delivered to Highways. Once it has been costed and positioned on their priority list we will be pressing them for urgent action.

PLAN TO ACTION

So the village plan is finished. There's lots of good stuff in there. Many groups out there with plans and dreams and perhaps less time and money than you'd like to achieve them.

Do not despair. There are grant pots available. One relatively easy pot to access is the Peak District Community Planning Grant. This comprises money from Europe and the National Park Authority. There is also money available from your village agent via Single Regeneration Budget 5 and Europe.

These grants are very local, few villages are eligible for them, and they are specifically intended to help villages that have worked hard to produce village management plans.

The Authority (and the Derbyshire Rural Community Council for village agent money) administers the grants and it is very easy to access if your project is right, (this grant carniof fund pure spons projects). The forms are easy, the decision time is short for sums up to £6000, and the grant is specifically aimed at satisfying village needs as included in the village plan. I can get an application pack to you quickly and help you fill it out if needs be.

Other villages in the National Park have already had some of this (Peak Forest, Parwich, Tissington, Youlgrave, Bamford.) These and other villages are eligible for this years' money. The grants will not be around for ever and there is up to £10,000 total grants that could go to Bradwell if groups can get projects done by the end of December. Also, if our grant poesn't fit the bill, there are other sources of money we can put you on to

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Obituaries

Mr Charles Robert Bland of Wortley Court died in Newholme Hospital aged 86 on Good Friday April 18th. He was born in the village and had three sisters, Margaret, Eileen and Marjorie. Apart from a short time in Sheffield and his army service during the war, he lived in the village all his life. After leaving the church school, he worked at a poultry farm at Thornhill, then in Sheffield before returning to drive for Mr Eidson. He joined the army in October 1939. During the retreat to Dunkirk he got separated from his battalion arriving during the last days of this evacuation. He spent his 21²⁷ birthday on the beach at Dunkirk, being taken off the following day, a few hours before the end of evacuation. He rejoined his battalion at Ycovil a week after the rest of them. On leaving the army he went to work at the cement works, first in the quarry, then the packing plant and then on the

For many years he raised money for SWFC. In 1963 he started raising money for the Sports Club and largely through his efforts over £5,000 was raised which eventually enabled the purchase of the field at Stretfield. He was a founder member of the Bowling Club and its Secretary from 1983-1994. A funeral service followed by interment took place at St Barnabas Church on May 2nd.

Mrs Terry Spring on April 28th of Miners Cottage, The Hills, peacefully in Calow Hospital. She was the widow of David who died almost eight years ago. Son Adrian, daughter Fiona, grand daughters Hannah and Emily and grandson Haw survive Terry.

Born in Sheffield, she married David in 1944, and in 1970 moved to Grindlow and then to Bradwell in 1989. Terry was involved with the Children's Well, designing and drawing the picture. She would ask the school children to draw pictures using their own ideas. She had great patience when showing the children how to stick on the petals. She was a wonderful artist designing book jackets, wallpapers, design for cotton printing, calligraphy, and featured in "Past Times" magazine and others.

A founder member of Gt Hucklow and District WL she was vice-president at the time of her death.

Terry will be greatly missed by family, neighbours and many friends, who showed their respect for her at Hutcliffe Wood Crematorium.

To the Editor

I am writing in response to an article in the last edition, regarding the suggestion of a public car park in a field off Town Lane. I am strengly opposed to the idea. I am not keen on the encouragement of tourism to Bradwell generally as I feel it has a genuinely special "local" safeness to it which I think has been lost to other local villages which are swamped with tourists.

I would be interested to know how our crime rates vary, particularly in car thefts. I think that it would be a real shame if our parks were over ron with strangers at the weekend, like Bakewell for example.

In my opinion Bradwells main downfall is the amount of traffic which passes through, so why encourage more?

If we really must look at ways to boost tourism, why not do it to the mutual benefit of locals, e.g.;

- Provide bus services to surrounding villages such as Eyam.
 Improve on existing services to Buxton, different areas of Sheffield. Or perhaps even a link to Hope station.
- Sign posting and keeping clear public foot paths / rights of way. In particular ones which link us to other villages.
- 3. Improving on general amenities like an outdoor pool like the one at Hathersage. Or perhaps a community based cafe. A car park on Town Lane would do nothing for the people of Bradwell, it would be in the wrong place to be beneficial to residents who have problems finding somewhere to park. Also the corner of Town Lane and Main Road is already tricky for pedestrians and drivers.

I admit that this is also a case of "not in my backyard!" as part of our garden joins with the proposed field.

Since we moved in three years ago we have witnessed a vast array of wildlife from pheasants, birds of prey and bats, to butterflies, dragonflies, toads and hedgehogs, not forgetting the visiting polecat last autumn.

I am extremely concerned how tarmacing the field next door would change my garden and the wildlife which lives within it. The thought of swapping the tranquil sound of bird song to the noise of engines, alarms and car stereos. And of course then there is the litter, which I'm sure wouldn't take long to blow all over the garden, the lack of privacy, not to mention the safety of my children and our belongings.

As a possible alternative, how about using part of the grass verge on Main Road which runs alongside the park. At present it is used only as a dog poo area and is less likely to suffer from car crime as it is more visible to passers by.

Can anyone tell me how encouraging tourism would boost the economy of Bradwell, and how it would benefit local people?
