PC NOTES

Planning Application for the Newburgh site:

On Thursday 15th May, Mr. Vincent Middleton handed a letter to a PDNPA officer withdrawing the Newburgh planning application. The application was due to be considered by the PDNPA Planning Committee on Friday the 16th May 2014. This follows all the hard work over many weeks by the parish council and by the village organisation, "Bradwell and the Newburgh Development" (BaND), in planning, co-ordinating and rehearsing the speeches for the planning committee meeting. We now await developments to see how Newburgh will proceed.

Annual Parish Meeting (APM):

The Annual Parish Meeting took place on Wednesday 21st May 2014 in the Methodist Hall, following welcoming refreshments served by your parish councillors. Last year's successful format was repeated which was designed to be more interactive, to engage with village groups and to discuss a broad range of issues of village importance. The meeting consisted of an overview of parish council activities given by the Chairman of the parish council, presentations by a number of village groups / organisations, a summary of the Newburgh Planning Application, a series of short presentations on a number village issues and concluded with a Q&A session with representatives from our District councils, the PDNPA, the Fire Service & the Police. The one consistent message arising from the presentations by village organisations was the need for younger people to join in the enjoyment and activities of these organisations.

Approximately 50 residents attended and the meeting concluded at 9:30 p.m. with expressions of thanks and appreciation from residents.

Neighbourhood Plan:

Work associated with producing the Neighbourhood Planning (NP) have been reviewed and the project plan has been updated. Another public meeting is planned for 24th June and writing of the policies will take place over the summer period so that they will be ready for submission to the PDNPA by December. All documents so far obtained are being filed to provide the required degree of evidence, and consultations with village organisations are continuing. A NP is seen as vital to help the village contest future development applications not deemed to be appropriate.

Youth Club:

The Youth Club has been running, free of charges, since 2007 in the Newburgh Hall (old Antiques Centre) by kind courtesy of Newburgh Estates Ltd. Council and Youth Club members are very grateful for use of this facility. However, this arrangement has now been terminated, so the Youth Club is now looking for new premises in close proximity to the village centre. If anyone knows of suitable premises, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Car Parking on Soft Water Lane:

The first element of the promised DDDC grant has now been received so that this project is able to proceed. A Planning Application for change of use for the site is to be submitted to PDNPA.

Playing Fields & Open Spaces:

The survey report of council owned trees, commissioned by Council, has been received. The report indicates that the vast majority of trees are safe and in good condition and only a small number will require any attention. This work is being planned. The report also suggests that a Tree Management Plan should be implemented. It is suggested that trees in the village should be reviewed every three years and trees outside the village every five years. Once research on this subject is completed, a proposal will be presented to Council.

Clearing the Brook:

DCC are again inviting applications for 'Clean-Up' projects and Council has again applied to have the Brook cleaned by the Probation Service in advance of the Bradda Dads Duck Race during Carnival week.

Village Signs:

Council is investigating the possibility of installing some 'Welcome to Bradwell' signs in the grass verges. Once the design has been finalised, this will be sent to DCC for approval and a licence for installation sought.

BRADWELL'S BELGIAN REFUGEES In the First World War

The assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his wife Sophie in Sarajevo on 28th June 1914 is now a well known contributory cause of the First World War that was declared a month later. The name of the assassin, Gavrilo Princip, is equally well known. It is perhaps not so well appreciated that the weapon used by Princip was a FN Model 1910 semiautomatic pistol designed by John Browning and manufactured by the company of Fabrique Nationale (FN) of Herstal near Liege in Belgium. On 28th July German forces swept into Belgium in an attempt to outflank the French Army. An immediate target for the invading army was the city of Liege and of course the armament manufacturing factory of FN at Herstal. Liege had fallen by 7th August and its citizens prepared to wait out the war they believed would be over by Christmas. It soon became clear that this was a vain hope, so thoughts turned to fleeing across the Dutch border and then as far away from the front as possible. One group that took that route was M. Fontaine and his wife and three daughters. M. Fontaine had every reason to leave Belgium because his post had been that of Chef de Bureau at FN at Herstal. Indeed one of the first German shells fired at the Citadel of Liege burst through the window of M. Fontaine's office (he was thankfully elsewhere). For 10 days the family hid in cellars but then decided to flee. Escaping at midnight they crossed the country passing the town of Vise, that was in ruins, and arrived at the Dutch frontier after giving a considerable bribe to the German sentinel for allowing them to proceed. Eventually they reached Maastricht and arrived in England by way of the port of Flushing. Nor were the Fontaines the only ones to take flight in late 1914 and 1915. No fewer than a quarter of a million of their fellow countrymen escaped to England. On arrival in England the Fontaines made their way to Sheffield and from there they came to Bradwell in late 1914. About 15 - 20 Belgians came to live in Bradwell in the First World War and for many of them their stay was much more prolonged than that of the Fontaines (the last mention of a Belgian in Bradwell was in 1917).

Even before the arrival of the first Belgian refugees Bradwell had formed a Belgian Relief Committee chaired by the vicar,

Rev AT Cowen. The treasurer was Mr Craig, who also acted as interpreter. The purpose of the Committee was to oversee all aspects of the needs of the new arrivals. We are fortunate that the Minute Book of the Committee has survived and even more fortunate that Jessie Barber who kept the records did so in an immaculate hand, as would be expected of a teacher. Jessie was also the aunt of two famous Barbers with Bradwell connections: Noel who was a renowned novelist and Anthony who became Chancellor of the Exchequer. The Committee identified houses in which the Belgians could live and if the property was unfurnished they found furniture. A group of Lady Guardians was set up with two or three ladies being responsible for greeting each new arrival in Sheffield, bringing them to their new homes in Bradwell and then overseeing the welfare of the families (especially when the husbands were fighting in France). Another group of ladies set about collecting food around the village with one lady taking responsibility for collection in each designated area. To Be Continued.....

Last month was our Resolutions meeting and we voted to adopt the resolution to encourage friends and family to consider signing on to the NHS organ donation register. So many different organs of the body can be used to help others, from the fairly obvious heart to the less well known tendons, and even your skin can be a life saver. At present in the UK we use the opt in system - you need to positively sign on to the register. In 2015 Wales will be moving to the opt out system and it will be assumed that you will be on the register unless you positively deregister. 25% of us are on the register, although 65% of us would be prepared to donate if asked. However, two thirds of families would say 'no' if they weren't aware of the deceased wishes. So, if you wish to donate organs do register your wish and tell your family.

We hope you enjoyed the winter tubs this year, we will be replanting them in their summer attire soon, and work has already started on the Town Bottom garden.
