FOBS



PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Car Parking: A space has become available to rent at Softwater Lane Carpark. The cost is £25 pcm or £300 annual. If you are interested in renting, please contact the parish clerk.

Carnival: Following another successful carnival this year, we have already begun planning for next year. A meeting is planned for Wednesday 24th October and the location will be publicised on the notice boards by the Memorial Hall and in the bus shelter by the Peace Gardens. If you want to be involved in the planning or have any ideas to help make carnival even better, please come along to the meeting

Town Bottom Toilets: Operation of the public toilets is now the responsibility of the Parish Council. A cleaning schedule has been implemented, with the toilets being fully cleaned every second day and a replenishment service done on the non-cleaning days. Feedback from residents would be appreciated as this is all new stuff for Council and we are feeling our way. You will have noticed that the gents toilet has been closed. The reasoning behind this is that there are three usable toilets on the end of the building, closing the gents reduces cleaning costs and water usage, and it will make it easier to manage the facility during winter months, as we are planning to keep them open throughout.

Newburgh site works: Work by Western Power is scheduled to start in September on the Softwater Lane side of the village, where there will be traffic light control and one way traffic lasting up to 19th October. We are expecting a certain amount of disruption for the duration of this work.

Waste Management: Derbyshire Dales District Council are asking residents to take part in a survey on how they use the waste and recycling service and how they would like to see it develop in the future. Posters explaining about the survey have been posted on the two notice boards in the village. The waste collection contract is soon due for renewal and council are looking at ways to reduce costs. This is an opportunity for people to provide their views on the service and where the funds can best be allocated.

Youth Activities: Cllr Sowerby has organised monthly events for Bradwell young people (school years 6 to 11) through to September 2019. Many grant applications have been received from various bodies and groups to fund these events, with grateful thanks to Better Derbyshire Dales, Breedon Cement Works and Carbolite for their generous donations. Watch for posters around the village advertising these events.

S137 Grants: As we often communicate, Council maintains a fund of money which can be awarded as grants to village groups / organisations. If your group has a specific need for funding for which your current resources are insufficient, you can apply for a grant. Please contact the Parish Clerk.

Public Participation: Residents continue to attend council meetings to raise matters of concern directly with Council. We welcome members of the public at both the main council and all committee meetings. Council meetings are generally held

at 7:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday of most months in the Methodist Lounge on Towngate. See the parish notice boards (on the side of the Memorial Hall and in the Peace Gardens bus shelter) for meeting announcements and agendas.

A LETTER FROM THE MINISTER

Recently, I came across the word 'liquid' to describe the world we live in today. It struck me as a good image. Think of water. It adapts its shape and movement to whatever medium happens to contain it. It even changes its state according to its surroundings: it freezes solid in cold weather, thaws when it warms up, changes into a gas at boiling point. Rather like life in today's world: constantly changing and adapting to change. Many of us grew up with solid certainties. Now, we question some of these certainties. We even recognise that some are not true. My parents saw white British supremacy as self-evident. I can't hold to that. Not because it's no longer 'politically correct', but because I know it simply isn't true. In a rapidly changing, liquid world, how do we make our choices? How do we decide which attitudes are right or wrong? Sometimes we're tempted to go back to the old certainties. Sometimes the easy option beckons: go with the flow, adapt to whatever is the fashion of the moment, or follow whichever voice is shouting most loudly. Where can we find a focus? A solid foundation on which to build lives worthy of us as human persons and human communities? I can only answer for myself. For me, Jesus Christ is the foundation. He is 'the same yesterday, today, and forever', as we read in the New Testament. Jesus Christ, inseparable from his community, the church, in which I find him and where he finds me. It's there that I discover some solidity, an anchor for my life in a liquid world. What about you? May God bless you and yours, Fr Martin Clayton (Parish Priest of the Catholic Churches in the Hope Valley)

EYAM AND BRADWELL SURGERY NEWS

This year we will be running flu vaccination clinics with Health Care Assistants (HCAs) Judi and Zoe. If you are eligible for a free flu vaccination you will be sent a letter inviting you to an appointment. Please note, these clinics are appointment only - they are **NOT drop - in**. Please try your best to attend your allocated appointment. Should you need to re-schedule this appointment please let us know as soon as possible. **Please support your GP practice** by having your flu vaccination done at a surgery. You may have seen advertisements at your local chemist or supermarket offering flu vaccinations. For every flu vaccination given by another healthcare provider, Eyam and Bradwell Surgery miss out on valuable funding. ONE MAN'S WAR

The Last massed Cavalry charge of the British Army

Early in the 20th Century the Darneley family used to meet in the house called Dale End in Bradwell on each 4th August. So



they did in 1914 (the day War was declared) when this photograph was taken. *Present in the photograph of 1914 were from left to right Marion, Kate, Edwy (father), Annette, Alwyn, Hilda and a friend with mother Kate in the deck chair.*

The family had a long association with Bradwell with

Edwy's father Alwin John Darneley being born in the village in 1817. Two sons are missing from the photograph: John and Oswald (Ossie). John by then was married and living in Hampshire and Ossie had joined the East Riding Yeomanry in 1913.

Oswald Hugh Baskett Darneley (Ossie)




Edwy ran A J Darneley and Son, the family building business, established in Hull in 1840. Ossie started school at Eton House School, Albany Street in Spring Bank, Hull before moving to Hull Technical College where he studied a wide academic curriculum which included Cabinet Making. He took those skills with him when he joined the family business. He was a very intelligent person with a quiet sense of humour. He joined the East Riding Yeomanry on 8th July 1913 aged 17. It was a

part time occupation running with his day job, like today's Army Reserve.

East Riding Yeomanry (ERY)

The Yeomanry men signed up to fight only if Great Britain was invaded (an early Home Guard). When war was declared his

Unit was sent to Northumberland on coast watching duties (hence his absence from the family photograph). When the requirement for them to fight abroad was realised they had to volunteer individually. Ossie volunteered.

In July 1915 the ERY was sent to Costessey in Norfolk for Cavalry training, they were there for three months. It was decided to send them to Gallipoli so their horses were taken away and they began training as Infantry. This order was then reversed so their horses were returned and Cavalry training began again.



PERSONAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

NEVILLE KINNAIRD



Neville (Nev) Kinnaird died peacefully at home on 5th September after a long battle with cancer. Born in Derby on 28th February, 1938 his childhood was spent living in Alvaston, south of Derby. He attended Bemrose Grammar School in Derby, where he first met Peggy Attwood (she of the old house over the brook on Brookside). He socialised in the same gang as Peggy when they were teenagers, although

this did not continue past school days. Neville left school at sixteen and ten days later, much to his chagrin he started work with Derby Council's housing department, which employment had been arranged by his father. Nev gained qualifications in housing management, and in his early twenties he moved to London to work in housing, sharing accommodation with Old Bemrosians. He met his future wife, Betsy during the course of his London social life and they were married at St Mary's Church, Pimlico in 1967. They then moved to Norwich, where daughter Justine was born in 1971. In 1972 they moved back to London, initially living in a flat in Brixton provided by the Guinness Partnership (housing, not the drink!) and where Nev started his new employment. They then moved into the family home at Queen's Gardens, Ealing in 1972 and Neville became Director of Housing for Hounslow Borough. It was at this time that he invented the phrase 'social housing contract', which was then shortened to 'social housing', and of course is still used today. During the mid 1990's he worked for the Peabody Trust and in 1991 he and Betsy moved to Cromford

where Nev worked with Methodist Housing. In 2003, he retired and started voluntary work at several locations, including the House of Lords. This was also the year that Betsy died and his grandson Gabriel was born. In 2008 Neville made contact with Peggy Attwood through 'Friends Reunited' and in 2010 the family home at Queen's Gardens, Ealing was sold. Neville then moved to Bradwell, where he bought Honey-suckle cottage and became an integral part of village life. He was the first chairman of the newly formed Bradwell Community Land Trust, was a key figure in the pantomime, playing the giant in Jack and the Beanstalk and many other characters, and was a member of the Orchard Group. He also used his extensive experience in housing matters when he served as a director of Dales Housing from 2011 to 2014. The funeral was at Our Lady of Sorrows church in Bamford on 21st September, followed by cremation.
