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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Council Finances:

The 2018/19 accounts have been approved by the internal auditor. Council has approved the overall Governance and the Accounting Statements, and these will be posted onto the village website. The same external auditor as previous years - PKF Littlejohn have been appointed and they will carry out a review of the accounts. The forms required for this process have been completed and it is expected the audit will be completed by the end of September.

Council Committees:

Council have reviewed all committees and decided that some should be combined. Chairs were appointed to all committees and a list of all the committees and members have been posted to the website. As with all meetings members of the public are very welcome to come and participate. Time is allowed at the beginning of every meeting for public participation. Notifications of the meetings are posted on the village notice boards in advance.

Parish Council:

There are currently two vacancies on the Parish Council, so if you are interested in joining please contact the Council Chair clldowning@bradda.org or the Parish Clerk at parish-clerk@bradda.org. This is a great opportunity to join a proactive council and we would welcome new team members.

Carnival 2019:

It is getting close to carnival time on Saturday 3rd of August and the organising is going very well. Road closures have been applied for and all premises along the carnival route have been advised. We are still looking for help in a number of different areas e.g. stall organizing, marquee erection, road closures, judges for different events and general help on the day. Please let us know if you can assist and we hope to see you at Carnival

Bus Route:

There have been many instances of buses being blocked by parked cars when driving along Brookside. Council are concerned that these incidents may eventually lead to the bus service being withdrawn from the village. A discussion is taking place with Derbyshire County Council re the feasibility of creating a bus turning area at Dale End. Initial DCC reaction is positive but time will be needed to analyse costs and funding. We will keep you informed as the project develops.

Car parking: There is now one space available to rent at Softwater Lane Carpark. The cost is £25 pcm or £300 annual. If you are interested in renting this space, please contact the parish clerk

Public Participation: We welcome members of the public at both the main council and all committee meetings. Council meetings are generally held at 7:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday of most months in the Methodist Lounge on Towngate. BRADWELL WAR MEMORIAL HALL

A History

In her account of the History of the Bradwell War Memorial Hall published in 2011, the late Lillian Riddall tells us that in 1919 a referendum was held in Bradwell. The vote was to help the village decide how best to commemorate the sacrifices of the men of the village in the First World War. The ballot paper allowed for a choice from five options and in addition voters could make a pledge of money in support of the option they chose. The result of the referendum was announced at a public meeting on 25th March 1919. Overwhelmingly the vote was in favour of the building of an Institute or Memorial Hall - 88% of the 276 votes cast, with £697.17.6p being pledged in support of the project (£35,352 in 2018 money). At the public meeting it was agreed that the War Memorial Hall project should be carried forward by a committee of 20 to supervise the process (although in the event 22 were elected!). As the scheme of governance of the Hall evolved the committee came to consist not only of elected members but also of representatives from each of the clubs, societies and other organisations in the village. (Thus in 1986 the Committee consisted of 15 elected members and also the representatives of 16 village organisations.) Therefore, from its early days to the present the War Memorial Hall has been funded and managed directly by the villagers themselves. In addition, especially when big changes were being contemplated for the building, grants from Village, District and County Councils and donations from charities have helped to augment village fund raising efforts. In the early years a big fund raising focus was on Carnival day in August. By 1920 the land on which the Hall was to be built had been purchased. But thereafter the implementation of the result of the referendum got bogged down in negotiations on planning permission and on tenders for building work. Members of the Hall Committee must have become increasingly concerned with the slow progress and in early 1923 they elected a Building Subcommittee with Allen Bradwell as its secretary. They were charged with driving the project ahead even if compromises had to be made over exactly what sort of a hall should be built (a one rather than a two storey building, for example). This Subcommittee was evidently very effective because we know from looking at the Hall now that by 10th November 1923 Frank Mills of Brough had laid the foundation stone. The Hall was duly opened on 12th July 1924 and the 1925 accounts showed that the total cost of building had been £1941.7.11d (£105,062 in present day terms). As the Hall was completed so the General Committee began identifying how and by whom the hall was to be used. A key step had come in 1924 with the appointment of a caretaker. This was Mr J Howe who was to be paid 4/- a week for this his tasks included getting in coke, attention to the lavatories (which at that time appear to have been fairly primitive), window cleaning and maintenance of the 'heating equipment'. In addition he was to be paid 2/- for general meetings with an extra 4/- for whist drives and dances, concerts and socials. These 'extra' payments must have been numerous because in later years his annual earnings were said to be £70 - £80. The position of caretaker has continued to this day to be a key one in the running of the hall

BRADWELL AND EYAM SURGERY

Public Health England (PHE) has issued a fresh appeal to young women to take up the invitation of a cervical screening test, also known as a "smear" test. Figures published this winter show a fall in the number of 25 - 29 year old women being tested. PHE is urging all eligible women (aged 25 - 64) who are invited for cervical screening (smear tests) to take the test. The test detects abnormalities within the cervix that could, if undetected and untreated, develop into cervical cancer. **Cervical screening currently prevents 70% of cervical cancer deaths.** However, if everyone attended screening regularly, **83% of cases could be prevented.** Women aged 25 to 49 who are registered with a GP are invited for screening every 3 years. If you are a woman between the age of 50 and 64 you will be invited to attend every 5 years. If you are embarrassed about having the test or worried about what the test results might say please book a telephone consultation with one of our Practice Nurses or GPs who will be happy to discuss the test, explain why it is so important and help to put your mind at ease.

GREEN ACTION

MARRIAGE - DOYLE-TATTERSALL





JOYCE ELIZABETH GOULD 'Nurse Gould'



Joyce was born in Glasgow 12th April 1926 with her twin sister Marion. When they were one, they moved to Manchester due to her father's work as a tailor. This is where her two brothers and sister were born. In 1937 they returned to Glasgow where she worked hard at school and won a scholarship to the local academy. They returned to Manchester in 1939 and in 1944 she started her training to be a nurse and into midwifery. This is when she met her beloved George, who was a

military patient, survivor of the sinking of HMT Lancastria 1940 in the Bay of Biscay. Training was very strict but Joyce loved it. It was like 'Call The Midwife' on her pushbike cycling around Moss Side, Hulme and other areas of Manchester. In October 1948 they were married in Swinton and they moved to George's parents' small holding, Rulow Knob Farm above Macclesfield. She worked and resided during the week in Manchester and spent weekends with George in Macclesfield. Nurse Gould was appointed as district midwife for the Hope Valley in 1954. They first lived in Tideswell before moving later to Granby Villa in Bradwell. This was her dream job - actually it was her vocation. Nurse Gould, day or night, on duty or off duty, was there, her patients always her priority. The job was very challenging as times were very different then, some households didn't have phones, TV's or cars and some no

mains water. She never missed a confinement, even in the hardest winters and there was a convoy of tractors or Land Rovers ready if she needed them. After a busy day, Joyce loved her retreat to Granby Villa. There was always a good smell of home cooking and a welcome for all. Joyce had a daughter, Jane and son, Simon. In 1986 she retired after 31 ½ years as the District Midwife – some achievement. A little later she went back to work at the maternity unit at the Whitworth Cottage Hospital for a further 7 years. Joyce and George now had time to travel and so visited many countries – Pakistan, India, China, and Canada. This provided Joyce with many subjects for her other passion, her talks, some on her travels, spinning and others on midwifery, all in aid of Cystic Fibrosis. She received a silver award for her work for the charity. Joyce and George attended one of the Royal Garden Parties at Buckingham Palace and she actually met the Queen years later when she received the Maundy Money at Derby Cathedral. Joyce enjoyed gardening, simple planting but very productive. She had great Faith and enjoyed her work with the Church, arranging, comforting, supporting and making cups of tea and being there for Wakes week. She was taught to knit and sew by her mother and carried on through her life even taking up spinning and finally quilting, she had a weekly group of quilters up at Granby Villa in later years. Joyce cared for George during the later stages of his life until he passed away in May 2007. When Simon and Beverley returned from working in Southern Ireland that year and set up Riverside Herb Centre, Joyce took great delight in helping out and meeting up with lots of her previous patients and hearing all their news and about their new generations of babies. Joyce passed away on 12th May 2019 and the funeral was held at St Barnabas Church on 28th May, followed by cremation at Hutcliffe Wood.
