Parish Council Notes

Annual Meeting

Having been Chairman for 3 years, I decided to retire at the Annual Meeting, although I will continue as a Councillor. I nominated Alan Slater for Chair and Reg. Davies for Vice Chair for the next year and they were duly elected

<u>Membership</u>

Jenny Lawson's application to join the Council was unanimously approved, bringing our membership to 9 Councillors and leaving just one vacancy.

Lafatge Liatson Meeting

At the meeting on April 20th, we were saddened to hear of the death of Ian Tomlinson. Ian had regularly addressed the meetings until his retirement last year.

Andy Smith gave us an update on the expansion of rail facilities and despatches.

The new depot at Theale, which covers Southern England and is wholly supplied from Hope works, is now taking 200,000 tons per annum. When phase 2 is completed it is expected that 600,000 tons p.a. will be delivered to Theale from Hope. To facilitate this expansion of rail activity, seven new jobs have been created, increasing the rail staff complement to 16.

Rail despatches, including the special trains for Heathrow Terminal 5 construction, have increased by 40% over the past year and it is hoped that they will eventually exceed 1 million tons p.a. and represent two thirds of all cement production at Hope.

Hope is currently the only dry-process works in the UK which is direct fited (fuel blown straight into kilns). Lafarge are now seeking a 'variation to permit' to construct indirect firing facilities, which would include two new stacks. The benefits would be improved efficiency and controllability, resulting in better clinker and a reduction in unauthorised releases. It is hoped that the first kiln will be converted by the end of next year.

This year marks the 75^{th} anniversary of the establishment of 'Earles' cement works at Hope, and Lafarge are celebrating this with a bonfire and exhibition at the works in November. They will also be running a Christmas card design competition for local schoolchildren and displaying old photos and archive material at their Hope Show stand.

Peak District National Park

The Government review of National Parks highlighted the need for greater interaction with Parish Councils and other local communities on planning matters. The Minister, Alun Michael, has created a 'Planning Delivery Grant' fund to facilitate this and other initiatives.

Peak Park have responded by creating the temporary full time post of 'Community Engagement Officer', which will be advertised shortly.

Obituary

Gordon William Shaw died on the 20th April at his home in Wortley Court aged 83 years. He was truly a Bradwell man, born at the Bowling Green on the 16th November 1920 and to be the only son of William Arthur and Beatrice Vinar Shaw.

He spent his childhood and youth growing up around his family, spending many hours at Thornhill, where his Mother's Sisters and Brothers lived. He went to Bradwell School and to St Barnabas Church and like many others joined the choir.

When he left school at the age of 14 he started work at G & T. Earle. (Now Lafarge Cement.) as an apprentice electrician. During the latter part of his apprenticeship he was called up to do National Service, which was in the R.A.F. This was to be short lived as he was ordered to report back to the cement works to continue with his work in helping to produce Cement.

It was soon after this when he met Edith, who had been transferred from G & T. Earle at Hull to Hope works. They were soon to be matried, and over the years they had three children. Gordon continued to work at the cement works until he took carly retirement at the age of 62.

After his retirement he along with other founder members constructed the Bowling Green, once the Green was complete he had many enjoyable hours playing the game of Bowls. One of his other hobbies was making walking sticks; he would spend hours getting the stick to his liking. He had a caravan on the East coast where both Gordon and Edith spent many happy hours. Also he enjoyed a pint of beer and a good chat with his friends on Sunday lunchtime.

However Gordon did not have very good health during the last few years of his life, therefore he was unable to get out and about.

His cremation took place at Hutcliffe Wood on 28th April, followed by a thanksgiving at St Barnabas. Gordon will be sorely missed by his family and friends.
