PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Wheelie Bins

Janet Goodison has completed her year as Chairman of Derbyshire Dales District Council and has now been given the task of introducing wheelie bins throughout the District.

I don't know whether this will be a one or two bin system but I guess there will be a greater recycling element than before.

There are two concerns about the use of wheelie bins in Bradwell.

One is that some of our lanes couldn't accommodate the collection vehicle and I wonder, therefore, how far some residents might be expected to wheel their bins to a collection point.

The other is that some Councils, which have a two-bin collection system, empty each bin on alternate weeks – which means that refuse can be up to two weeks old before collection. Some of these Councils have had to switch back to weekly collections because of the number of complaints about smelly bins, and I trust that Janet will bear this in mind when making her recommendations to DDDC.

Cool

- was the response to Councillor Ashley Briggs, from a group of teenagers, when he showed them an illustration of the new 'state of the art' shelter proposed for Town Bottom Playing Field.

The shelter, which will have been discussed at our July meeting by the time you read this, incorporates stainless steel seating and solar-cell/battery-powered lighting. It would be situated where the north-end goal now stands, and facing the play equipment.

Another proposal is for a slight reduction in the football pitch area and smaller goals.

If the shelter proposal is agreed at the meeting, it will probably be conditional on the acquisition of grant funding - as the installed cost would be in excess of £12,000.

Please let us have your views.

Obituary

Ben Wilson was born in May 1929 at Town End, Bradwell, and the eldest of the three sons of Jim and Doris Wilson.

He attended Bradwell Church School from 5 years old until leaving at 14 to start work at G & T Earle's Quarry.

Ben did his two years National Service with the Royal Engineers and worked on various projects with the army in the U.K. including Salisbury Plain and Catterick camp.

On returning to civilian life he returned to work in the quarry, driving heavy-duty vehicles including dumpers and bulldozers. After over forty years service at the cement works Ben took early retirement.

In 1952 Ben and Dora were married, just before Christmas, carols were sung long and loud at the Horse and Jockey at Tideswell. They started their married life in a bungalow just outside Tideswell on the way to Millers Dale. Ben either came to work on a pushbike or as a passenger on his father in law's motorbike and sidecar. Later, Ben and Dora had a motorbike and sidecar of their own. After a while Ben and Dora moved to Smalldale. They had two daughters, Pat who was born at Plantation Cottages, now Tideswell Picnic Area, and Anne who was born in Smalldale in 1955. As we all know, sadly Pat died earlier this year. After the death of Ben's parents Ben and Dora moved to Town End and for the last few years have lived in Hallgate View. After the marriages of Pat and Anne, James, John and later Nicholas, became welcome members of the family.

Ben and Dora were proud grandparents to Matthew, Gemma and Joseph and have followed their progress through education and work with keen interest. Throughout his life Ben had a keen interest in singing, following a family tradition. He loved singing carols at the White Hart at Christmas time and also at the George Hotel at Castleton.

Ben continued his interest in singing by joining Tideswell Male Voice Choir of which he was a member for 23 years. Members of the Tideswell Male Voice Choir lead the singing at Ben's funeral andalso rendered several of Ben's favourite songs. Ben had been an enthusiastic member of St Barnabas Singers since its formation in the 1990's.

Ben took a lifetime interest in the community of Bradwell; this is reflected in the numerous organisations he became involved with and to which he gave his total commitment. He was a founder member of the Junior Football Club, serving as Chairman and as President for several years. Gala week was a busy period for Ben; he helped on the first Saturday as a parade marshal and other duties. He was Chairman of the Wells Dressing Committee. On the last Saturday he helped with the Scout Sheep Roast and fund raising event. Other duties during Gala and Well Dressing Week included acting as a route Marshal for the Fell Races. For a number of years, Ben helped with the erection, decoration and dismantling of the sets for the Centenary Players productions.

Ben loved the countryside and up till recently each day he would go and feed his hens and look and listen. About this time of the year he would announce he had heard the cuckoo and seen the first swallow.

During his army service Ben became involved in Tug of War matches, with this background he was persuaded to become trainer for the White Hart Tug of War team.

For several years they took part in local competitions winning various trophies. Ben was very proud of his photograph album of the Tug of War team.

Other things Ben became involved with over the years included, loading waste paper at the Methodist Sunday School, collecting meals for the Luncheon Club, mowing grass in the Church Grave Yard, and helping at Hope Agricultural Show. Despite all these involvement's, what Ben will be remembered for, by those closest to him, will be as a family man. In good times and bad, laughter and sorrow, Ben was always there and as this rock he will forever be remembered and sadly missed.

A Tribute

As organizer of the Bradwell Luncheon Club, on behalf of the members, I would like to offer our sincerest condolences to Mrs Dora Wilson and family on their very sad loss. Ben had been a volunteer driver for the Luncheon Club over many years.

We are all grateful and very appreciative of the time he gave to Luncheon Club, and I personally will miss his cheery smile and the sound of his voice, both vocally as well as his call "are yer mashin"? when he would sit down and have a cuppa!

He is and will be sadly missed.

Rebellion Knoll WI

On May 26th, the Rebellion Knoll branch of the W. I. held their "Resolutions" meeting at Bradwell sports pavilion. Three resolutions were presented to the members. The first was to arge the government to legislate against the trafficking of human beings, especially women and children, for sexual exploitation and forced labour. The second resolution called on the government to ban the cultivation of GM crops in the UK as there is growing evidence that they have no benefit for either people or the planet. Both these resolutions were approved. The third resolution called upon the government to make substantial annual funds available to support the Air Ambulance Service. This appears to be a worthy cause but as it may also mean the service being made subject to tighter controls and red tape, the meeting was unable to endorse this resolution without further information.

Having voted unanimously on these decisions, the W.I. members then enjoyed the social part of the evening - a friendly chat over a "faith" supper and a glass of wine.
