PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

TV Film

Nearly 100 people queued at the Memorial Hall on Friday the 10th of September to apply to be one of the 60 odd 'extras' required for the six-episode comedy drama to be filmed here and in Castleton over the next 3 weeks.

All were photographed and, by the time you read this, the successful ones will have been notified of their scenes and filming dates.

The pub interior scenes will take place in the Bulls Head in Castleton, but many of the exterior scenes will be shot in and around Bradwell. Proposed locations include Towngate, Bridge-End, the Church and Churchyard, The Hills, Far-Cotes, and the large field opposite the Sports-field on Stretfield. This field will be the setting for a village fete, which will be filmed on Sunday October 10th. The Lafarge Cement factory will also be used for some scenes.

The production company, RED, will need to control traffic on filming days and will be asking some residents to help by parking elsewhere for limited periods. The current schedule dates for Bradwell village exterior scenes, which could well change, are September 28th and 29th, and October 1st, 4th, 10th and 11th. They are happy for us to watch the filming but ask that we stand quietly in the designated areas. Some filming will be at night, with very bright lights, but they will always finish by midnight. They say offers of tea/coffee would be very welcome.

Deadmans Clough

In my September 'notes' I reported that this area, surrounding the old Bradwell reservoir, would be opened to walkers from September 19th. Mr. Ernest Rowarth phoned the editor to express his concern that this was misleading because it might encourage people to walk on the reservoir banks, which will remain private. So I walked to the site on September 20th, via the new access stile near to Robin Hoods Cross on Bradwell Edge to check. The access area is clearly marked on the new Ordnance Survey maps and the private reservoir area is well defined by fencing and barbed wire. There are good views of the reservoirs from outside the fencing, so I don't think anyone would be tempted to trespass beyond the private boundary.

Access to the site is, however, quite difficult from the Edge so I've asked Peak Park Rangers to discuss, with Mr Rowarth, the possibility of access from Hazlebadge.

Lafarge

Tables will be provided and Lafarge will donate £25 to each participating group.

Certainly, since the 16th August we have seen something in the region of sixty visitors, some friends from down south, some new friends welcoming us and some here on business delivering, reading the meter or come to see me on pastoral matters. On one level life in the manse is no different from our life before, we still have fun together as a family, we still row occasionally, and we share times of sadness together. On another level life is very different, now my office is in my home and people phone me up as all times of day and night, we never know whether the call will be a friend, a colleague or someone with a problem. We eat together; we watch television together, and even enjoy music together. We all agree homework should be banned and that someone should invent an automatic room tidier. Does anyone know which box my best jumper is in? We found the hospital in Chesterfield at 10.30 pm one night after my daughter fell down the stairs; she was fine, but needed to be checked over. We found the doctor and dentist when a sore face turned out to be a tooth infection, and to-day we found the letter left by Geoffrey and Hazel Senior telling us where all the local amenities are, someone had opened it and put it on a pile for future reference, we could have done with that over the last month.

Before anything else this is our home, it is where the four of us live and life is never anything but exciting. You are always welcome here, though we do prefer you to ring first, just to make sure we are in. As I close I want to thank the people of Bradwell for their very warm welcome, not just for me as Methodist Minister, but for the whole family, it is so good to walk down the Village and have so many people stop and talk.

Obituaries

William (Bill) Cooper of Wortley Court, Bradwell died on 12th August, in the Northern General Hospital, aged 84 years. He was the eldest son of Mr. Thomas and Mrs. Ada Cooper. He was born in Bradwell and went to the Council School. At the age of 10 he fell from a tree in the Newburg Field and broke his arm. He spent the next 16 weeks in Hospital and never regained the full use of his arm. His Parents not being well off, visited him by walking to Sheffield and taking the train home. He left School and worked for Mr. Joe Daniels on his Poultry Farm, before leaving to work in the Packing Plant at G. & T. Earls. He met his wife Kathleen Brennan, during the war, whilst working for Cooke and Stephenson's at Brough. After the war Kathleen and Bill moved to Bournemouth when he worked in Insurance until taking early retirement at the age of 61, when they moved to Hope for 2 years until Kathleen's death. Bill then returned to Bradwell. He was a keen walker and set a fast pace which his companions had difficulty in maintaining.

He leaves a brother Denis, sister-in-law Nancy and Nieces and Nephews. The Funeral and Interment took place at Our Lady of Sorrows Catholic Church, Bamford on the 20th August.

Mr. Eric (Rex) William Carpenter Emery of 3 Michlow Drive, Bradwell, died on 21st August, aged 95 years. He was born in London, the son of Mr. Harold and Mrs. Ellen Emery. He went to school in Dover, Surrey and Leeds, before joining RAF Halton as a boy entrant in 1925. After several years, he left the RAF and emigrated to Australia, when he travelled round the country working as a Boundary Rider and Lumberjack before returning to England. He was a Member of the League of Frontiersmen, which was affiliated to the Canadian Mounted Police. It was in this capacity that he took part in the Coronation Procession of King George VI in 1937. In 1939 he re-joined the RAF, and became a Signals Officer before reaching the rank of Squadron Leader. He married Gladys Young in 1948 and retired from the RAF in 1963. He then worked in the Civil Service until his second retirement in 1970. He became a voluntary member of the Community Health Council and Red Cross in Cambridgeshire. In his spare time he enjoyed flying, horse riding and playing the flute and bagpipes. He came to Bradwell in 1990. He leaves his wife Gladys, two daughters Julia and Gloria, and Grandchildren. The Funeral took place at St. Peter's Church, Hope on the 1st September.

Mr. Reginald (Reg) Ashton, of Chapel-en-le-Frith, died on 23rd August, at Wythenshaw Hospital, aged 80 years. He was born in Bradwell, the son of Mr. Charles and Mrs. Mary Ashton. Reg attended the Church School before taking an Apprenticeship with the Newburgh Engineering Company. Seven years later he went into the Army and served 2 years with the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. He served some of this time at Tell-el-Kibir in Egypt.

He left the Army and married Doreen Aldred and went to work for the Oil well Engineering Company in Stockport. Three years later he returned to Bradwell and the Newburgh Company. Before going to work at Tell-el-Kibir in Egypt. He was there during the Suez War and interned for four months before returning to England to work for the High Peak Engineering Company in Castleton. He moved to Plymouth as Works Manager for M.L. Engineering Company. After 16 years he moved to the Land Registry Office at Plymouth until his retirement when he moved to live at Telford and Highbridge, before returning to Chapel-en-le-Frith 3 years ago.

He leaves his wife Doreen, Daughter Susan, Son Peter, four grandchildren, a great grandson, sister Joan. He also had a son Robert who has pre-deceased him. The Funeral and Interment took place on 31st August at St. Barnabus Church, Bradwell.

Pat Allen, Parish Councillor

Pat Allen became a member of Bradwell Parish Council in September, 2004. Pat was born in Guildford, Surrey. She was trained as a Pharmacist at Kingsway College, London.

In 1969 she met Stan Allen, he was serving with the Grenadier Guards. They married in 1970 and have one son Gary. Pat travelled all over the world for the next twenty years and on Stan's discharge from the Army they moved back to Bradwell - Stan's home village. Pat worked for D.D.D.C. Social Services as a Home Help for fifteen years, going all around the Valley. She left when Stan became ill. When Stan died in 2002 from Leukaemia Pat took a break from care work and joined the local Co-op Shop. She has since left and is now back doing what she likes most - caring for people old or young. Through her work in the care sector Pat has met people from all walks of life and she enjoys the challenge of making a difference to people's lives.
