PARISH COUNCIL NOTES**Christmas Lights**

Sorry they didn't appear quite as promised in my last notes. We learnt afterwards that the Peace Garden electricity supply had been cut off by the Power company. Then Julian's bereavement, for which we offer him our condolences, meant he had insufficient time to arrange the Netherside illuminations. He managed to put lights on the Beggars Plot – Town End bushes, but they were pulled down by vandals, on Dec 20th.

Road Closure

Just in case you hadn't spotted the notices, the B6049 will be closed from Dale End to Windmill between 8am and 4pm from January 10th to 18th. There will be some limited access, but not for HGVs. Through traffic will be diverted, from Brough & the Anchor Inn, via Grindleford, but for locals the Top Road is the obvious way round.

Ice

We've had several complaints about ice on public roads and paths where cars have been washed. Please consider walkers and avoid car washing in such places on frosty days.

Planning issues

Peak District National Park has just published a free planning handbook, with clear explanations and step-by-step checklists to help you through the planning process. It explains what could affect an application, such as a Conservation Area, Tree Preservation Order, archaeological features, rights of way or protected wildlife habitats. If you're thinking of making an application, I recommend you phone 01629 816361 or email aldern@peakdistrict.gov.uk and request a copy.

PDNPA are looking at ways to better use Parish Councillors' local knowledge in the planning process. Currently, we circulate proposals to members for comment and the Parish Clerk then summarises our views for Planning Officers. Most decisions are delegated to Officers, but if a Parish Council or neighbour disagrees with an Officer's recommendation, the application is referred to the Planning Committee and applicants and objectors can apply to address the meeting.

To avoid 'friends and neighbours' pressure the PC has agreed fixed policies on two planning issues.

1 – We automatically object to any application involving major alterations to 'affordable' houses - which were originally built with grant subsidy by social landlords. We believe that, apart from simple and necessary improvements, they should stay in their original form, to remain available as 'affordable' properties for future generations. We leave considerations of applicants needs, and availability of alternative accommodation, to the Planning Authority. Our objection may seem a futile gesture because, under present legislation, providing the extended floor area does not exceed 87sq. metres, the application is

likely to be recommended for approval anyway. But we and most other Parish Councils hope to get this practice halted so that villages can preserve their range of 'affordable' stock – particularly two-bedroom starter homes.

2 – We also automatically object to 'retrospective' planning applications. We believe that there is no excuse for starting demolition or development work without, at least, checking whether planning approval is necessary, and we will not condone such actions or support such applications.

There has been some controversy in the village on both these issues recently so I thought it might be helpful to make our position clear.
