PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Annual Parish Meeting

This was held on April 5th and was attended by twelve residents. The guest speaker was PC MacGregor, our village Policeman. He referred again to the low level of police time given to Bradwell, which is due to the relatively few complaints received. He said that if we want more attention then we must report all incidents to the special central freephone 'Crimestoppers' number, which is 0800 555111. Every call is treated with absolute anonymity, if requested, so that nobody will know the identity of the caller, and calls are never traced. Rewards are available and are paid without compromising a caller's anonymity.

PC MacGregor made it clear that even if a reported incident should result in court action, it would not be necessary for the witness to attend. He said that under the new rules he could take a statement on the witness's behalf and that would be accepted as evidence, without the witness having to be named in court. He spoke about three progressive levels of letters, which could now be sent to parents of young offenders, warning of action which might be taken by the Police. After the third level, offenders could be offered the alternative of an Antisocial Behaviour Contract or Court Action. Antisocial Behaviour Orders can now be issued by Police, District Councils or Housing Associations.

He said that Vandalism is a term no longer used by the Police. Criminal Damage is now the description, and much of this is related to under-age drinking of alcohol from the offender's own home. Apparently Derbyshire Dales DC have a mobile CCTV camera, which can be made available to Parishes, but needs a wall bracket and power supply.

A letter was received from Roy and Wendy Weston, which they had copied to Peak Park and DDDC, complaining about the 'Appalling General Air of Neglect to be observed in the Village of Bradwell'. Copies were made available to those attending and one will be displayed on the notice board.

In his annual report on the Parish Finances, the Parish Clerk, Richard Jarman, explained the reasons for the 28% increase in the parish precept for the new financial year. One reason is the massive increase in maintenance cost of the two playing fields, due mostly to a doubling of the price of our grass-cutting contract with Derbyshire County Council, whilst our grant from District for this purpose has not increased. The other is the extra funding, which has been requested by, and granted to, village organisations.

PC Chairman, Councillor Alan Slater, reflected on his first year in office and on the achievements he felt had been made.

Kath Chapman requested that the PC call a public meeting

over the new village flood map and that the Environment Agency be invited to answer questions. A show of hands signified support for this and the Clerk agreed to make arrangements.

lan Daniels again requested that off-road parking be found for residents, rather than introducing more restrictions on our streets. He suggested that grants ought to be available for this. The Clerk agreed to investigate further.

District Councillor Janet Goodison expressed disgust at the Parish Precept, which she believed to be the highest (per capita) in Derbyshire Dales District. She also suggested that the site of the old British Legion should be converted into a car park for residents.

We will discuss these matters and other points raised, at our next meeting at the Memorial Hall, on May 10th.

BRADWELL CONSERVATION AREA ANALYSIS

As we who live here know, Bradwell is a unique Peak District former lead mining village, where small miner's cottages line the steep, narrow, winding streets. In recognition of this special character Bradwell was designated as a Conservation Area in 1976.

The Peak District National Park Authority is in the process of reviewing the Conservation Area boundary and are producing a Conservation Area Character Analysis. The analysis sets out the reasons why an area is worthy of designation and includes historical information about village development. It is in the form of a map with marked features and is accompanied by a written descriptive statement. It is a useful guide for residents and professional advisers when considering development proposals.

Whenever a draft analysis is produced, the Peak District National Park Authority will liaise with the Parish Council on consultation within the community, as the analysis may contain changes to the Conservation Area Boundary.

REBELLION KNOLL WI - BRADWELL

An informative and enjoyable meeting was held on Wednesday 13 April 2005 when David Jarvis of the Sheffield Assay Office addressed members and a draw was made for items of produce ie: coffee and ginger cake recently received from Taylors of Harrogate. The lucky winners were Monica Taylor (coffee) and Lynda Cliffe (ginger cake). Lynda Cliffe introduced David who very kindly deputised for Ashley Carson (Assay Master) who was unable to attend as previously arranged. David presented a most informative talk on various aspects of hallmarking 'the world's' platinum, gold and silverware. A short video on the history and complexities of 'hallmarking' was enjoyed and David entertained us with various stories of the beginnings and need for 'hallmarking' which originated (in Britain) during the reign of Edward I (aka Longshanks – he of William Wallace fame) not only to salve the vanity of Edward I but also to keep an eye on unscrupulous Silversmiths and Traders. We were informed that there were originally many Assay Offices up and down the country and the rivalry between them was intense. These many offices are now depleted to just four: London, Birmingham, Sheffield and Edinburgh. UK Assay Offices are world leaders in their field and recognised for their high standards and are held up as a role model and envied throughout the world.

David brought several pieces of 'early' and 'modern' silverware and compared how they were produced in the past to how they are manufactured now, using modern techniques, explaining that delicate items of silverware were 'hallmarked' using laser technology. Following the vote of thanks, members were able to view the silverware more closely.
