PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Anti-social behaviour and criminal damage: PC MacGregor attended our October meeting to report that senior police officers are now making these problems a priority issue. Work schedules and logistics are being reviewed with the objective of greatly increasing police patrol time in Bradwell in order to apprehend culprits and deter further incidents. He hoped that the changes would be in place by the end of the year.

Bradda Dads Bonfire: We agreed to sponsor the children's bonfire again this year and thank the Dads for organising this very popular event.

Lafarge/PC Liaison Committee (October 11th): Works manager, John Capewell, reported that more than 3000 visitors had attended the September open weekend at the works. A photo/film exhibition of the events is planned for later in the year, when old magazines and photos of the works and staff will also be on display. There may be a nominal charge – which would be donated to the tsunami appeal. Plans of the proposed new offices and greatly expanded rail facilities were displayed and discussed and a possible completion date of April 2007 was suggested.

Lafarge are considering the possibility of burning recovered fuel oil (RFO) in the kilns, as well as meat and bone meal (MBM) and tyre chips. RFO is old engine oil, which has been collected from service stations and filtered. It is currently burnt in power stations. However, the power stations cannot comply with the new waste incentive directive (WID) regulations, which come into effect on December 28^{th} , and they may have to stop using it. Lafarge kilns will comply by then and the cost advantages of burning RFO would be considerable. About 400,000 tons are collected annually by processors and Lafarge are hoping for a trial very soon possibly before the MBM trial. Unfortunately all three of these coal-substitutes can only be delivered by road at the moment and each could replace up to 20% of the current coal consumption. Mr. Capewell said they are all currently used in continental cement works - which gives them a significant cost advantage over UK operations.

The Michlow Dig (see photo): Not quite as exciting as the spectacularly successful Stanlow excavation, but it did serve the purpose of establishing that there is no significant archaeology under the site of the planned new housing development at Michlow. Because of its proximity to Grey Ditch and the line of the old roman road, planners made it a condition of approval that an exploratory excavation should be made. This was carried out in October by archaeology Group, who carefully worked down through the levels to the ice-age

clay of 10000 years BC. They found no roman artefacts, but did unearth some excellent Mesolithic flint tools. So the development can now go ahead without the fear of destroying important archaeological evidence. Chris Furness

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
STANLOW UPDATE

Pauline and Arthur, from the Sheffield University team which carried out the dig at Stanlow, presented a case history, enhanced by film and a selection of artefacts, to a packed audience at the October Historical Society meeting. Any visible features of a barrow were destroyed in the nineteenth century and the stone used for road works. However, from previous historians' reports and the siting of Stanlow, the team rated it as an important neolithic site, on a par with Minninglow. The team's major discovery in their three year dig was a shallow grave containing the skeleton of a 'woman' in her mid-twenties, with a long (neolithic hunter) skull rather than a round (later farmer) one.

This rare and important find is receiving further expert study and carbon dating at Oxford. The team have been told that their tall 'Mary' may turn out to be a young man. Many other human fragments were found close to the grave, probably associated with ancestor veneration. Complete flint tools were also found, plus animal remains and bits of a six foot bison. The team proved that the skeleton was of a local person, not a wanderer. The site has now been restored to its pre-excavation condition. Arthur and Pauline said that nothing would have been possible without the support of the land-owner, Stan Sidebothan and the tenant, Alan Ridgeway

SOLAR ECLIPSE

An eclipse of the sun happens when the moon moves in front of the sun, blocking all or part of the sunlight. A **total** eclipse happens when the moon exactly covers the sun, and it gets dark in the middle of the day. What is not commonly known is that the moon's orbit is slightly elliptical, so at some total eclipses it appears slightly smaller (farther away) and is not big enough to cover all of the sun. Such an event is known as an annular solar eclipse, and one such just occurred (October 3rd) down in southern Spain. Your editor was there - camera and filters clutched in hand, and managed to take a series of photos of the event. Below you can see the eclipse in three stages, as the moon progressively moves over the suns disc, covers it, then moves away again.

THE PEAK DISTRICT NATIONAL PARK

Securing The Future

Four key issues emerging from an 18-month consultation by the Peak District National Park Authority will be the focus of public forums during October/November - including an event at Hope Valley College on 3rd November. In the past 18 months many issues have been debated during 'Help Shape the Future' - the biggest-ever consultation in the Park's history. Four issues are likely to have the biggest impact on the Park's future:

Farming and the rural economy Housing Sustainable local communities

Young people

These are now the focus of public forums so residents can meet representatives from some of the main organisations coordinating action on the issues. Several have already taken place, but others are planned (all are held between 6:30pm and 9pm): **3 Nov, Hope Valley College - Engaging young people in**

National Park issues

17 Nov, Wincle school - Sustainable local communities The culmination of 'Help Shape the Future' will be the publication of the National Park Management Plan - a document to guide management of the Peak District National Park for years to come. MR. GEORGE CYRIL BANCROFT of Main Road, died at home on 1st October, aged 78 years. The only son of Merzah and Eva Bancroft he was educated at Bradwell Council and New Mills Grammar Schools. On leaving school Cyril went to work in the Drawing Office at G. T. Earles Cement Works, remaining there, apart from his Army Service, until his retirement. He attended Night School in Sheffield, where he obtained National and Higher National Certificates in structural and reinforced concrete design and mechanical engineering. He served in the R.A.S.C. from 1945 to 1948, some of his service being in Italy and Austria. On leaving the Army he returned to the Drawing Office, eventually in charge. Later he was promoted to Projects Manager before taking early retirement in 1985. In 1951 he married Betty Mackenzie of Castleton and they set up home in Bradwell. Cyril was a talented musician, being organist at the Methodist Church since 1948 and accompanist to several choirs, including Mrs. Ashbury's Ladies Choir, the Methodist Circuit Choir and, for 18 years, the Bamford Singers. He was also very interested in trains and spent time studying and digesting railway time-tables. He leaves wife, Betty, son David, daughter Elizabeth, daughter-in-law Jacqui, son-in-law Timothy, grand-children Charlotte, Sam, Hannah and Lucy. His sister, Mildred, pre-deceased him. The funeral was at Hutcliffe Wood, followed by a Service of Thanksgiving at the Methodist Church on 11th Oct. Betty and family thank everyone who attended the Thanksgiving Service, gave donations, sent cards, letters and flowers, all appreciated at this sad time. Generous donations amounted to £1,200, to be divided between the Parkinson Disease Society and Bradwell Methodist Church.


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CARAVANNERS TREAT
