PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Bradwell Dale

As I reported in a previous newsletter, the PC Rights of Way Committee met with representatives of the Peak Park 'Vision Project' team to discuss a possible plan of action for the Dale. The recommended plan was presented to the Council meeting on December 5th and agreed unanimously. The overall long-term aims of the plan are -

1. To enhance the landscape of the Dale by opening it up - by the selective removal of trees, scrub and Japanese Knotweed.

2. To conserve and enhance the historic, geological and wildlife features.

3. To develop footpath access into and through the Dale encouraging people to explore the local heritage and use the Dale for informal non-motorised recreation. To link the new access to the public rights of way network further up the Dale.

4. To provide on-site interpretation of the archaeology,

geology, history and wildlife of the Dale.

5. To encourage Bradwell residents to become involved in surveying, monitoring and conservation in the Dale.

The Parish Council owns part of the Dale, but there are also three other landowners whose co-operation will be necessary to make this whole project viable. The 'Vision Project' officers have agreed to contact them all initially and we look forward to working with them for mutual benefit.

Planning Policy

By a very narrow majority, we have agreed to drop our policy of automatically objecting to major extensions to ex-Council or ex-Housing Association houses. We set this policy three years ago because we wanted to preserve the 'affordability' of these properties for future generations. However, the 'flood' of applications we feared might result from soaring values, has not materialised and we will now treat them in the same way as other applications. Just for information - we don't have a Planning Committee and we don't discuss applications at Council meetings. Planning application documents are circulated to each councillor - who then gives his/her opinion to the Parish Clerk. The Clerk then establishes the majority view and passes this to the Planning Authority together with any relevant comments. We feel this method eliminates any danger of intimidation of individual Councillors.

Beggars Plot Shelter

We are aware that this project has some detractors, but the PC is solidly supportive and has agreed for it to be sited on Beggars Plot. In case there are any misconceptions about its funding, I will re-iterate that it is not funded from Parish reserves. All the funding has been raised by the Police and Derbyshire County Council Youth Service, from various grant

bodies.

Planning permission is not required, but we sent the design drawings to the Peak Park Authority for comment and they, as we expected, said they would have preferred something more traditional. Our experience of vandalism to the old traditional shelter in Town Bottom field makes that option unacceptable, and it would not satisfy the requirements of teenagers - or the Police. The new shelter will be transparent, illuminated by solar panel/batteries and fitted with a police-controlled closed-circuit music radio (low volume) for entertainment. Once installed, the shelter's future will be determined by the attitude of the teenagers themselves. They have made it very clear that this is what they want and we hope they will make good use of it - at the same time respecting the rights of other users of the field and the privacy of nearby residents.

Affordable Housing

The needs survey which we were promised, by DDDC Housing Dept., for November has obviously not materialised. We will now press for it to take place in February. Chris Furness

SOME VIEWS ON THE YOUTH SHELTER

A Letter sent to Bradwell Parish Council

On viewing the site plan of the Community Youth Shelter, the proposed site gives me cause for concern on the following :-

- The plan shows the proposed site to be on the south side of the Beggars Plot adjacent to the busy B6049 road and across from the junction of Bradwell Head Road.
- I note that a basketball net is to be erected next to the structure, therefore ball games will be encouraged to be played next to this busy thoroughfare, which is used by H.G.V's travelling to and from the local cement works.
- The Bradwell Head Road junction to the B6049 consists mainly of council residences for the elderly.
- I consider the proposed site to be unsafe for children, whatever their age, to use as a play area especially for ball games and especially in the dark winter months. I am sure that you are aware of the recent fatality on this same road not far from the proposed site.

I propose that you consider an alteration of the site either to the opposite side of the Beggars Plot adjacent to the Gore Lane which is a road used by the minimum of traffic, or to the area behind the current goal posts at the top side of the football play area where there is more surrounding space which would allow for misplayed balls to go astray in safety. Your consideration will be appreciated. *Name and address provided.*

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MR FRANK MILLS

Frank Mills died at Broomfield Hospital, Chelmsford on 27th November aged 80 years. Born in Sheffield, the only son of Joseph and Beatrice Mills he was educated at Hope School, as the family moved from Sheffield, firstly to Bamford and then to Hope. In 1935 Frank won a scholarship to the London Choir School, where he remained as a border until the age of sixteen. During the war the school was evacuated to Seal Chart, in Kent. In 1943 he joined the Fleet Air Arm, training in Canada and The United States. On leaving the forces he came to live at the Bowling Green Inn, which his parents had taken over during the war. In 1948 he married Audrey Bradwell of Bamford and they lived in the village until moving to Essex earlier this year. Frank worked at Ferodo and Midland Ross (Cambion) as personnel officer, and finally as managing director. He took early retirement in 1986 due to ill health.

He loved music and was a member of various choirs. For 20 years he was a member of the Peak Singers, of which he was also Chairman. For a number of years he was honorary President of the junior branch of the St John Ambulance Service, based at Hope. He was one of the leading members of the team which carried out the alterations to the Parish Church in the early nineties. During the last few years he suffered from Alzheimer's Disease, and earlier this year he and Audrey moved to be near their daughter. He leaves his wife Audrey, daughter Lindsay, grandsons Alex and Chris and great-grandson Brandon. His sister, Joyce pre-deceased him. The funeral took place at St Lawrence Bay on 11th December, followed by cremation. A memorial service, followed by burial of ashes will take place at St Barnabas Church on 25th March.

MR ALAN MARSDEN

Mr Alan Marsden died on 5th December at Moorland House, Hathersage aged 72 years. Born in Bradwell, the only son of Ronald and Edna Marsden, he was educated at Bradwell Council School. He spent most of his working life at the cement works, initially in the packing plant and later as a locomotive driver on the line between the works and Earless Sidings. His career was interrupted by National Service, most of which he spent in Malaysia as a dog handler. Alan married Margaret Lowe and lived in Bradwell until their divorce some years later. He was a keen walker and walked the Pennine Way with the Bradwell Walkers. He leaves sons Anthony and Stephen, grandchildren Elysa, James and Shaun, and his sister, Maureen. The funeral was at St Barnabas Church on 20th December, followed by cremation.

The family of the late Alan Marsden wish to thank friends and neighbours who attended the service for Alan. Many thanks for the cards and messages of sympathy received for their sad loss. Donations in memory of Alan will go to the Devonshire Trust Fund, Chesterfield Royal Hospital, Calow. Special thanks to the Rev Ian Davis for his kindness and the lovely service, to Ted Noutch and staff and also for the catering provided at the Methodist Hall.

MRS DAISY BIGGIN

Mrs Daisy Biggin of Morval, Bradwell died on 5th December at the Hallamshire Hospital aged 88 years. Born at the Station Cottages near Hope Railway Station she was the youngest daughter of John and Frances Jackson. Daisy was educated at Hope County School and then went into domestic service. firstly at Hope and then Hathersage, before marrying John Brown and going to live in Hope. In 1946 she moved to Bradwell, was married again in 1950 to Arthur Biggin and they lived at Rockside, Ruthavon, Oswald House before moving to Morval in 1960. She enjoyed gardening and painting, was a member of the Bradwell Women's Institute for over 40 years, a supporter of the Conservative Party and a dog lover. Daisy leaves a son Roger, sister Rene, stepsons Arthur, Colin and Derek, and grandchildren and great-grandchildren. A funeral service took place at St Barnabas Church on 19th December, followed by burial.

MR GEORGE BRAMMAL

His many friends throughout the valley will have been shocked and saddened by the sudden death of George Brammal. George died at the end of a carol concert given by the children of the Castleton School on behalf of the Old Folk. He worked in the welfare department at the Blue Circle cement works for many years and will be missed for his ever cheerful, ebullient nature. A crowded church for his funeral on 22nd December was a testament to the affection in which he was held.

THE CHRISTMAS STAR

We unfortunately ran out of space in the Christmas edition to run this article, but thought you might be interested in some of the modern theories about which astronomical events could possibly have caused the famous "Christmas Star" which guided the wise men to Bethlehem and the infant Jesus.

Much thought has been given to the possible causes of this

bright object and the main candidates are:

• A passing comet

• A supernova (a star which explodes with devastating force and brilliance and is visible even in the daytime sky)

• A conjunction of bright planets (Jupiter and Venus are both bright enough if they were close enough in the sky as seen from Earth)

As far as historians have been able to work out, the actual timing of Jesus' birth was between 3 - 7BC, and most likely in the month of September (and not the December date which we traditionally celebrate). Interestingly, when we look backwards in time we can see that several exciting astronomical events took place during that period.

Two **comets** were reported by Chinese astronomers, in 4BC and 5BC, but in those days comets were always associated with disasters and so it is felt unlikely that this would be our answer. There was indeed a **supernova**, visible for 2 months in March and April of 5BC, but although this is a possibility, supernovae do not move as the Christmas Star is supposed to have moved.

Which leaves us with a **planetary conjunction**, which is when two bright planets appear close to each other in the sky because their line of sight from Earth makes them appear to be in the same place in the sky. Amazingly, by tracing the planetary orbits backwards we can show that there was a very close conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn on 17th June, 2BC and indeed they were so close together that they appeared to merge into one very bright object. In addition, as they moved apart again it would indeed have seemed that the star was moving, and the illusion of movement would have continued from night to night as the planets moved apart again.

In all the time I have been an astronomer I have never witnessed such a close conjunction, and it must have been a quite spectacular event. So, maybe this object and event really was the "Star of Bethlehem". We'll never know the truth of course, and there remains the possibility that it was a truly divine event, with no Earthly explanation. Whatever the truth, I wish you and your families all the very best for the New Year as we slide gracefully into 2007. *Editor*
