PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Q Is the Town Bottom Playing Field Roundabout safe to use.

A Apparently not.

We were advised by ROSPA that it does not meet current safety standards and should be immobilised. This was done for us by Severn Trent when they returned it to its original position.

Sadly, the steel ground anchor, which Sevem Trent's contractor welded onto it was smashed off by vandals and Sevem Trent have refused to replace it.

We are now considering refurbishing the Roundabout to a safe condition, and Councillor Reg. Davies has kindly offered to crane it onto a lorry at his own expense so that it can be taken for sandblasting and repair cost assessment.

This may have happened by the time you read this, but otherwise please advise your children not to use it until we have declared it to be safe

Q I've heard that the Parish Council makes 90th birthday presentations to residents.

A Yes, we like to send our congratulations to established residents by way of a card, with flowers for the ladies and a bottle for the men.

Appointments:

Last Summer Gareth Storey was appointed Village Caretaker on a three month trial basis and this became a permanent appointment in November.

He is responsible for litter picking and basic repair and maintenance of equipment in both playing fields, and for tidying other Parish owned areas. He also maintains the main Parish footpaths, and repairs other Parish property, such as seats, when necessary.

At the Parish Council meeting held on Feb. 8th 1916, the following motion by Cllr. Shirt seconded by Cllr. Walker was carried unanimously – "In consequence of the nearness of the recent Zeppelin raid, we should obtain 400 leaflets and have them distributed to each house, warning the inhabitants when darkness comes to extinguish all lights or shade them so as not to attract attention"

Obituaries

Mrs. Hilda Eales (nee Rowland)

Mrs. Eales of Woodland Nursing Home and formerly of Connoly Court, Brampton died on December 10th. She was the only daughter of Arthur and Zoe Rowland and, until her marriage, lived at Lumford Cottage, Church Street.

She married Ernest, who lived at his parents newsagents shop, (now Clematis Cottage), but at the time was serving with the RAF. She started work as a telephone operator at Tideswell and then at Chinley Later she worked at the Chesterfield telephone exchange as an operator and finally as a superviser.

She leaves a daughter Wendy, a son Peter, three grandchildren, a great grandson, and a brother George.

A service was held at Saltergate Methodist Chapel followed by cremation at Brimington on December the 18th.

Mrs. Lilian Hallam (nee Andrew)

Mrs. Hallam of Gernon Manor and formerly of Ynot Cottage, Church Street. Bradwell, died on December 12th in the Chesterfield Hospital aged 92

Until moving to Gernon Manor four years ago she had spent all her life in Ynot Cottage where she was born.

She was the youngest child and only daughter of Isaac and Mary Andrew. For many years she kept a sweet shop previously run by her mother. After its closure the sweet shop was converted into part of the cottage. She was the widow of Herbert and leaves a daughter Nancy, a son John, and two granddaughters.

A service and cremation took place at Hutcliffe Wood Crematorium on December 19th



The Church Clock

Dated 1886, the clock was installed in the church by the makers John Smith Clockmakers of Derby with money left by Benny Giles. Benny was a hawker who was buried in 1883 in a grave by the vestry.

It chimes on five bells, four for the quarters and one for the hours, commencing its chiming at 5.15 am and stopping at 11pm. This is regulated by a notched and pegged wheel set on a shaft from the pendulum to the hands and controlling levers.

There are two drums at either end of the clock on which is wound the wire supporting counterweights. On the drums there are pegs both on the surface and the inside. These pegs activate levers connected to the bell strikers and connected to the drums are vanes, which act as a brake to keep the drums revolving at a given speed.

The whole clock is controlled by the pendulum as in smaller clocks, ticking once a second and is somewhat similar to a grandfather clock.

I wind the clock every three days. You have to climb two ladders of thirty nine steps before inserting the winding handle which is some two foot long. It takes about 80 turns for the hour drum and seventy turns for the quarters. These counterweights weigh in the region of two hundredweights, and finally the pendulum weight which at some twenty five pounds and twenty five turns is a doddle.

The clock has two services a year by a specialist and this is paid for by the church with occasional donations from the Parish Council. They have recently helped with costs towards renewing and re-conditioning the rods and levers from the clock to the bells.

This is a brief description of the workings of the church clock and if this sparks your interest in becoming an assistant winder (unpaid) please contact me - Donald Ashbury.

Introduction To Waist Watchers

Local men keen to improve their health are invited to come along to an *Introduction to Waist Watchers* session, to be held at Eyam Mechanics Institute on 5th February 2003 between 8pm and 10pm. Men from across the Peak District are encouraged to attend and are welcome to bring along their partners, friends and work colleagues to find out more about the scheme.

Supported by High Peak and Dales Primary Care Trust and run by the North Derbyshire Health Promotion Service, Waist Watchers is a project specifically designed to help men reduce the risk of heart disease, the leading cause of premature death amongst men in England. Studies have indicated that men aged between 30-60 with extra weight around their middle have an increased risk of developing heart disease and other illnesses, including strokes, diabetes and high blood pressure.

Participation in Waist Watchers is free to all and encourages workplaces and community sites across the district to form teams of men who want to reduce their risk of these illnesses.

The main intention of the scheme is to see a change in participants' waist-to-hip ratio through a mixture of education, support and exercise. Phase one of the scheme consists of tutorials, including sessions delivered by trained course leaders, on Fitness, Habits & Routines, Fat & Food and Stress & Relaxation, together with practical exercise sessions at an appropriate level for the group. Phase two sees participants enter into the Waist Watchers League, with the winning team receiving a health-related prize for their endeavours.
