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PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Newburgh Development

At our February PC meeting, councillors voted unanimously to object to the Newburgh planning application. Our main concern is the sheer scale of the proposal and its potential effect on the village. A detailed response letter is being drafted for submission to Peak Park and an appendix will be attached listing all the comments made to Councillors by the 30 residents who attended our surgery on February 13th. Councillors agreed in principle to hire a bus to transport electors to the Peak Park Planning Committee meeting, which will take place in April or May. Anyone wishing to use this service should contact the Parish Clerk (620329). Meetings are usually held on a Friday and start at 10am.

Peak Park meeting

About 80 residents attended the Peak Park Planning Officers' presentation and consultation in the Memorial Hall on Friday February 6th. Head of Planning, Bob Bryan and Northern Team Leader, John Keeley described the planning process and invited questions.

I made the following notes at the meeting -

Bob Bryan said that the purpose of the meeting was to describe the planning process and the policies to be applied in considering this application.

John Keeley explained that this is an outline application which has to establish a principle of need and whether that principle could be accepted. Precise design details are not necessary at this stage - they would be included in detailed applications at a later date. He said the committee would consider the application in April or May depending on the speed of response from the developer. If the planning committee makes a decision not supported by planning policy it could go to the full authority to decide, or it could be called in by the Secretary of State. If the application is refused, the applicant could appeal to the Planning Inspectorate.

Key - Q = question, A = answer, R = response

- **Q** What importance and weight do you attach to the referendum result?
- A It will be considered as evidence of village opinion
- Q What is the importance of a conservation area?
- A It gives an extra level of control to planners
- **Q** How can someone be allowed to raise an application on land they don't own?
- A Planning law does not consider land ownership as long as notices have been served on the owners by the applicant
- **Q** Has there been an environmental impact survey?
- $\mbox{\ensuremath{A-Yes}},$ the applicant has provided a statement which runs to 900 pages
- Q Who conducted the survey?
- **A** A specialist company commissioned by Newburgh
- Q What are the rules on car parking space provision?
- **A** maximum 2 spaces per dwelling. We will decide if those provided on the plan are adequate.

- **Q** How many accesses are there ?
- A 4 in total but just one main access.
- **Q** What about the impact of an enlarged Coop on the existing retail businesses?
- A That will be considered
- **Q** Will you consider the impact of population increase on schools and other facilities ?
- **A** We have discussed this and have asked the education, crime prevention and primary care authorities for their opinions but it isn't a precise science.
- **Q** Most of the village is related to five major primary families (not revealed). New people will have no connection. It's about people not numbers. A psychological impact assessment survey is required?
- **A** Don't know the answer to that but will make enquiries about psychological aspects.
- **Q** What is the PP policy on affordable housing permission?
- A It's based on need. We will be asking for the survey evidence
 which we understand indicates that 27 are needed for current
 Bradwell residents
- **R**. I work with Rob Cogings and he says he has doubts that 27 affordable houses are needed even for the whole Hope Valley.
- **Q** What about the scale of this application could PP decide it's too large?
- A yes we could.
- **Q** Who is going to employ the occupants of these 150 new homes will they all be commuters?
- **A** Yes it's quite likely they will be mostly commuters
- **Q** What about the noise and traffic impact on the houses close to the main factory building?
- A We will be taking that into consideration
- **Q** Two doctors have said that there is no need for increased medical services in Bradwell?
- $\boldsymbol{\mathsf{A}}-\boldsymbol{\mathsf{Y}}\textsc{es}$ we have heard that, but it will be up to the primary care trust to decide.
- **Q** Fifty people voted yes to the development in the Referendum. Will their views be considered?
- **A –** Yes if they write or email them to us.
- **Q** Why do we have to have such a big increase in houses is it to pay for the affordable homes?
- **A** We will be asking for a business case to justify the volume. If it is simply based on the provision of 27 affordable homes it may be unacceptable.
- R The scale is too great. It will destroy the village.
- **Q** What happens if the houses can't be sold or the developer goes bust?
- **A** The development rights would transfer to the new owner.
- **Q** We've heard this described as a Brownfield site, which I understand gives it greater priority for development. Is it all Brownfield?
- A No, just the industrial area much of the site is Greenfield
- **Q** Severn Trent know that the main sewer to the treatment works is inadequate, that's why they built the tank in the playing field. Will

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they agree to put in a complete new main if this goes ahead? **A** – We will be discussing this with Severn Trent, but it will be their decision.

Q - Who will control the site and sort out problems?

 $\boldsymbol{\mathsf{A}}-\mathsf{We}$ will want to see a comprehensive site management plan before construction commences.

Q - There appears to be nothing in this plan to prevent the regular flooding down Softwater Lane.

A – I believe there is something in the plan but cant recall what it is. (reinstatement of the old mill-race)

Q - John, you have said that in view of the scale of this application and the public interest in it, that it might be decided to hold a special planning committee meeting just for this application?

A – That is an option which we will discuss with the chair of planning, who could make that decision if it's deemed necessary.

Concluding remarks by Bob Bryan:

The village benefits proposed in the plan will be balanced against the number of open market houses. People should write in with their views – emails accepted. He added that he was pleased a referendum had been held. Apologies for anything missed or mis-heard. Chris Furness

PDNPA NEWS

Measures to tackle the impact of climate change and to help residents make planning applications are at the centre of the Authority's budget for 2009/10. The Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) has increased the grant they give the authority by 2.8 per cent, increasing the overall budget to £8.292 million. Most of the budget will be spent on maintaining the quality of existing services. In addition the authority has been given £200,000 to distribute to local community projects that benefit the environment through its Sustainable Development Fund. The extra investment in climate change issues will see £15,000 spent on delivering the Peak District Climate Change Action Plan. 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HOPE VALLEY RAIL USERS' GROUP 2008 Progress and Plans for 2009

The Hope Valley Rail Users' Group has grown quickly since September 2008 and we now have over 60 members in the Hope Valley and beyond. We aim to secure improvements to our rail service, in particular a better timetable. Key activities in 2008 included:

Lobbying for improvements to the line. Our response to Network Rail's 10-year plans for the line focused on the need to bring forward infrastructure changes that may help to increase capacity on the line.

Raising our profile. Our engagement with key transport bodies such as Passenger Focus and the Passenger Transport Executives and with local MPs has helped raise our profile. Nick Clegg, leader of the Liberal Democrats and a Sheffield MP, publicly supported our response to Network Rail. We had our first radio interview at the end of 2008 and hope for more in

Building alliances. We are developing strong relationships with key organisations, including freight companies, to try to develop solutions that work for all users of the line

Plans for 2009

Now we have a built a solid foundation of knowledge and members, our focus in 2009 is to engage with Northern Rail and to generate the political support to secure timetable improvements. The current franchise will be up for renewal in either 2011 or 2013, depending on whether Northern Rail meets performance targets. We will start lobbying the Department for Transport now to ensure that the conditions of the new franchise include an improved service on the Hope Valley line.

NUGENTS OF STONEY MIDDLETON
