



PARISH COUNCIL NOTES

Annual Parish Meeting - Wednesday April 28th

Please come along to the Methodist Hall on Wednesday April 28th at 7.30pm to hear the annual reports from our PC Chairman, Clerk, Finance Officer and Committee Chairs. This is your meeting and it is completely open, with the usual restrictions on visitor participation suspended. It's a good opportunity to give us your views on what we are doing, how we can do better and any new initiatives you would like us to consider. Any topic relevant to the parish council can be discussed – the Newburgh development, grit-bins, dog-bins, playing fields, footpaths – whatever is of interest. If you have a specific question in mind which requires detailed information or research it would be best to let the parish clerk know beforehand (620329) – so that he can answer it fully at the meeting.

Lafarge

At the Lafarge/parish liaison committee meeting on March 9th, works manager Ashley Bryan revealed details of the planned trials for burning PSP (processed sewage pellets) in the kilns and the open days planned for residents. Apparently MBM (meat and bone meal), which is currently burned, will soon be unavailable and we were told that PSP has been used at Cauldon works for 6 years without any problems. He said that the application to the Environment Agency would be made in late March and the four week trial would be in June or July. Tyre chip burning would continue and tyres + PSP would total 20% of the fuel, with coal remaining at 80%. Ashley reported that cement sales had increased recently and 17 full train loads were now leaving the factory each week. They have just completed one year without any safety incidents on the works. The total number of Lafarge permanent staff is now 192 and they have 58 full-time contractor staff on site. Following the success of last year's bonfire and fireworks display, it will be repeated this year on November 12th.

Fat Letters

Not strictly a parish council issue - but information which might be useful. We received two notes from the postman recently informing us of underpayment charges due on letters (both 8p underpayment + £1 admin charge) – necessitating collection from the post office. Apparently the letters had failed a letter-box 'fatness' test in the sorting office, even though one of them contained only a memory stick. Peter tells me that it is the sender's responsibility to ask for the test to be done at the post office before posting. Chris Furness

BRADWELL YOUTH CENTRE

The youth centre has been going for quite a long time now, and it has certainly seen some ups and downs. When the Parish Council appointed coordinator left the village and resigned his position, serious thought was given to closing the venture. This was primarily because volunteer helpers had been gradually drifting away and we couldn't guarantee to always have the centre open every week. We felt this would be too uncertain for the children because they would never know for sure whether or not the centre was open. However, at the last minute we were able to encourage Derbyshire Dales District Council youth services department to help us, by running a session every week. Although this would only be once a week, and the sessions were earlier than everyone would have liked (starting at 6pm), things seem to be going well. Although we have been through periods when youth services couldn't be here, things now seem to have settled down and last week we had 17 youngsters attending and enjoying themselves. New X-Box games have been purchased, which are proving very popular, and we are now exploring buying a Wii and other equipment to widen the choice of things to do. In addition, the range of food offered has been changed from the old "Tuck Shop" approach of sweets and chocolates, to sandwiches and hot food, which also seems to be proving very popular with the children. The next steps will be to widen the activities, especially through the summer months, to provide outdoor trips. This has been done before of course - remember the very successful Paint Balls trip last year - but the new stability has encouraged us to look into developing a programme of events for summer. CHARLES EDWARD BRADBURY

Mr Charles Bradbury died at Calow Hospital on 6th February, 2010 aged 90 years. Born in Manchester, the only child of Edward and Ada Bradbury, he was educated at the Bradwell Church of England School before joining the Royal Navy and training at "H.M.S. Indefatigable". Upon completing training he joined the crew of the cruiser, "H.M.S. Exeter", serving aboard the ship throughout W.W.2. He was at the Battle of the River Plate, which resulted in the sinking of the German Pocket Battleship, "Graf Spee". During this action sixty one members of the crew of "Exeter" were killed. Charles married Barbara Hawley and they lived in Ceylon (Sri Lanka) where he was stationed until leaving the navy. Back in civilian life Charles worked as an electrician for Lappins and they lived in Manchester until moving to Bradwell. For a while he had an electrical shop, before moving to the cement works, where he remained until retirement. Charles leaves his wife Barbara, daughters Christine, Margaret and Elizabeth, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. A funeral service took place at St Barnabas Church on 18th February, followed by cremation at Hutcliffe Wood.

BRADWELL'S FIRST COMPREHENSIVE SPORTS AND SOCIAL CLUB

Our thanks again to Chris Furness for this insight into the rise and fall of a Sports and Social Club in Bradwell, culminating in what we now know as Newburgh Engineering.

In 1922, Bradwell Liberal Association members were planning a huge expansion of facilities and activities in a move to what is now the Newburgh Engineering site. In November that year a prospectus was issued for a new company calling itself 'Bradwell Liberal Association Ltd.' with the stated aim of adding to the enjoyment and education of the people of the village. It was to have nominal capital of £3,500, divided into 7,000 shares of 10 shillings each. Eight Bradwell residents were named as directors, one of whom had already signed a provisional contract for the purchase of the Newburgh Arms site from the Hassop Estate. It included the Newburgh Inn, stables, out-premises and more than 9 acres of land. One stated intention was the discontinuance of the drinks licence in order to let the premises as a 'Temperance' Hotel and Boarding House for paying guests. The land would be prepared for out-door recreation - Lawn Tennis, Bowls, Croquet, Cricket, Football, Hockey, Boating etc. It was proposed to convert one of the existing buildings into a Club and Clubhouse, with facilities for education, social improvement, reading, drama and indoor games. It was even intended that the company would take over Caterer's bus service, then operating from the premises, and build a garage for the public service vehicles. It planned to let some of the garage space for residents' vehicles if required. It was clearly a very ambitious scheme.

The price of the property was £1,950, plus estimated purchase costs of £200. Mrs. Caterer, the tenant of the Inn and the land, had already been given notice to guit. The subscription list opened on 21st November, 1922 and closed on 9th December. The minimum total subscription was set at 3,000 shares (£1,500) - and 4,220 shares (£2,110) were taken up. A mortgage was secured on the property for £1,500, making a total initial working capital of £3,610. The accounts for 1929 show a loss of just £5 on turnover of £430. They indicate that a field was let to Bradwell Cricket Club for £6, and the house let to a tenant for £40. Cinema takings of £252 are shown, with a profit of £70, but it's not clear if the Cinema was in the club or the Memorial Hall (possibly the latter since it has a projection room). Billiards receipts are shown as £28. Tennis Club receipts £12. Socials and Whist Drives £14, and membership subscriptions of £10. Assets included Tennis Courts and fixtures at £184, Cinema equipment at £185 and Club fixtures and fittings at £179. The mortgage interest was £72 per annum.

1929 must have been the last 'reasonable' year for the Club. Liberalism was on the decline but, much more significantly, subsidised competition arrived that year - in the form of the new sports and social facilities provided free for employees of Earle's Cement. By 1936, the Club was heavily in debt and being pursued by creditors. There was practically no income and the property was deteriorating rapidly. The roof of the Newburgh Arms was giving way and letting in water. The chairs, billiard table, piano, etc., had all been sold to pay debts. Even a large sycamore tree on the site had been cut down and sold. There was nothing left to sell and the shareholders finally agreed the situation was hopeless and that the company should be brought to an end. The whole site was eventually sold to Isaac Middleton and became the home of Newburgh Engineering. Copyright – Chris Furness
