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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

New Councillor: At the last Parish Council meeting Zach Harrison was interviewed and co-opted to the vacant position. Zach is from Bradwell and lives on New Church Street. We welcome Zach as our new Councillor and look forward to working with him.

Purchase of land: Bradwell parish council have completed the purchase of a piece of land from The John Middleton Trust. This land has been referred to as "The track" in the past but council thought it a good idea to give it a new identity so it will now be referred to as "The Dumbles"

As researched by one of the councillors 'Dumble' is a dialect word meaning a wooded valley and is mainly (but not exclusively) confined to the north and east Midlands both as a place-name element and as a lexical item.

Now the land purchase is complete council will engage with Camstead to discuss the building of a pedestrian bridge from Bradwell Springs onto Softwater Lane. This bridge means that the remainder of the houses on Bradwell Springs can be completed, including six more affordable houses for rental.

Refuse collecting: Council continue to raise with District Council the poor refuse collection service. Whilst refuse collecting is not the responsibility of the parish council we are asking Derbyshire Dales District Council to consider a number of emergency options. Please watch Facebook and the village notice boards for any updated news on this.

New committees: Council has decided split the Public Amenities committee into two separate committees: "Land and Playing fields" and "Public Amenities – Buildings and Car Parking". This will improve focus on the different areas of responsibility.

Council Insurance: Council has renewed their insurance for the coming year. The certificates are on the village website. **Winter Preparations:** Although the weather is still mild preparations for dealing with adverse winter weather have commenced with the start of the audit of the grit bins around the parish. This is to ensure that the bins contain adequate supplies of grit for use on public roads and pavements. As was observed last year during the survey some bins are being incorrectly used as litter bins. Unfortunately, it means that the rubbish has to be removed before the grit can be used, so it would be great if this could be stopped.

Public Participation: Residents continue to attend council meetings to raise matters of concern directly with Council. We welcome members of the public at both the main council and all committee meetings. Council meetings are generally held at 7:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday. See the parish notice boards (on the side of the Memorial Hall and in the Peace Gardens bus shelter) for meeting announcements and agendas.

DERBYSHIRE DALES DISTRICT COUNCIL Heading for Net Zero

Derbyshire Dales councillors have unanimously supported a series of actions that further the District Council's progress towards its 2030 net zero carbon emissions target. At a full council meeting on Thursday 14th October councillors backed the actions, which include a grant application for £807,116, made to the Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme, for energy efficiency works and low carbon heating at authority's Matlock Town Hall headquarters, Agricultural Business Centre in Bakewell and Northwood depot. If successful, work will complete by March 2023, reducing emissions by 136,68t carbon dioxide equivalents annually - down by 17% on the Council's 2019/20 total. The meeting also approved a revenue budget of up to £30,000 to fund engagement of an expert partner to carry out a detailed feasibility study into the technical and financial viability of solar PV installations on Council land. Other actions will include disposing of the Council's Civic Car without replacement as part of a fleet emission reductions programme, and a 'climate change impact assessment tool' will be trialled for reports presented to Council, providing a consistent method of assessing the impact of projects or activities on the climate. Councillors also approved a climate change delivery plan - a working document supporting the core aims of the Council's Climate Change Strategy and Action Plan. The delivery plan will evolve as projects progress. As well as addressing the Council's own emissions the plan seeks to set out actions supporting emissions reductions in the district. These include:

- Delivery of further phases of the housing retrofit scheme across the district, reducing emissions and tackling fuel poverty – a grant application has been made for a further £907,500 of funding
- Funding the installation of electric points in Hall Leys Park so that event organisers do not have to rely on generators to provide power
- Organising and funding the visit of the 'fantastic homes' exhibition to our market towns and main villages to engage with and advise residents about domestic energy efficiency, renewables and low carbon heating
- Developing a community engagement plan bringing together residents to discuss what collective action is possible on climate change.

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Extracts from Methodism in Bradwell: Seth Evans 1907: As was common practice with books such a *Methodism in Bradwell* lengthy lists of the names of worthies who had donated to the building or renovation of the Chapel were included. Thus the name of Adam Morton appears on p 38 as having contributed a guinea to a building fund. Seth comments:

Adam Morton who lived in the house where Mr Tanfield's shop now stands on the Hills, kept a small pack of hounds on what is known as "Hunter's Green". He had such a passion for hunting that when his own wedding ceremony was commencing in Hope Church, hearing the sound of a huntsman's horn he bounded out of the church in quest of the pack and the marriage had to be solemized on a subsequent day.

It is said that when performances requiring a stage were to be mounted in the bridge-side Sunday School in the mid nineteenth century and later, (empty) beer barrels were rolled down from the Bull's Head Inn and planks were laid on top of them. Seth tells that in about the year 1850

There was a most alarming occurrence during the afternoon service at the School Anniversary. Besides a strong orchestra there were 81 female scholars on the platform, and it was during the singing of a chorus that the platform fell with a fearful crash. The scene may better be imaged than described. It was expected that many of the scholars would be seriously hurt if not killed, but fortunately there was only one girl injured, Alicia Middleton (Mrs Robert Barker), who is still living. The service of course came to an abrupt termination, but the evening service was held as usual.

In this case, with such a large number involved, the event described must have been in the Chapel, not the Sunday School. In describing the location of the early Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School as it moved from Smithy Hill to what is now Brook Buildings Seth comments:

In the bosom of a soldier slain at the Battle of Waterloo, there was found a Bible, in which was written, "A present from Bradwell Sunday School".

BRADWELL HYDRO PROJECT



Dennis was youngest of the nine children born to James and Nellie Booth and he spent his early years living in the centre of Sheffield. After leaving Woodthorpe Secondary School in 1947 he started an apprenticeship at Davy and United Rolling Mills as a Steel Plater. He met Margaret Macarthur at a Talent Night at the Springwood Hotel and they married at St.

Theresa's on 23 May 1953. The following month, Dennis was conscripted into the Army and spent his National Service in the Middle East. One of his weekly tasks was to drive a Centurion tank to collect the mail from the local town. Nobody ever attempted to steal the post, he said. On leaving the Army he resumed his career with Davy and United and was quickly promoted to supervisor. In 1957, Dennis and Margaret moved to Woodhouse where their three children Elaine, Neil and Simon were born. In 1969, Dennis began work at Newburgh Engineering as Fabrication Manager. The family moved to Bradwell in 1972 and made their home at Dialstone, Hill Head. Dennis retired at 61 and enjoyed his retirement with Margaret, bowling, walking and actively helping the family with childcare and home improvements. They made their retirement home on Springfield Close and were privileged to have such fantastic and supportive neighbours, in particular Dot, Gerald, Andrew and Sally. Throughout his life Dennis played a lot of sport. In the Army he was a cricketer and as a young man he played football for Davy United Works team and the local village team. In later years, he excelled at bowls, playing with the teams at both Bradwell Bowls Club and Hope Cement Works. He loved his family holidays, from the earlier days in Bridlington and Paignton, to the Spanish sunshine of Valencia and venturing further afield to Malaysia and Thailand. Dennis leaves three children, six grandchildren and three great grandchildren.
