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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

2022/23 Council Precept: The Council Precept has to be calculated and submitted to Derbyshire Dales District Council by the end of January 2022. For the coming financial year the Finance Committee proposed at the January Council meeting that the precept be increased by 2% to £52,494 and this recommendation was approved unanimously. The figure was calculated by reviewing and updating the five-year plan which Council put in place some time ago and which has been followed successfully for many years. The existence of a five year plan has smoothed out historical instances of major changes to the precept. The small increase this year, partly to anticipate inflationary pressures, follows a zero increase for the last financial year.

The precept is the amount of money requested by the Parish Council to discharge its responsibilities to the village. It is collected from you by the District Council (DDDC) as one of a number of charges (e.g., Police, Fire) which are included in your overall council tax.

Churchyard Flooding: Council continue to work with the authorities regarding flooding of the churchyard and a meeting was held in the village with County Councillor Sutton to review the issue and discuss an appropriate way forward.

Carnival 2022: Carnival Saturday this year is on 30th July. Planning for the day will start in February/March. If anyone would like to help with planning or to offer new ideas we would be delighted to hear from you. Please contact the Parish Clerk with any thoughts or you can attend the next meeting. Meeting notifications are posted on the notice board by the Memorial Hall and in the bus shelter by the Peace Gardens.

S137 Grants: Council has a fund of money available to award as grants to village groups / organisations and we are always happy to consider applications for financial assistance. These grants are available to help support any village organisation, club or society which operates on a 'not for profit' basis and which has a bank account. The funding must be used for the benefit of the residents of the Parish of Bradwell, Derbyshire. Any organisation, club or society wishing to make an application for Grant Aid must submit a fully completed application form which is available on the Bradda.org website and submit it to the parish clerk.

Planning Applications: The parish council is routinely consulted on planning applications submitted to PDNPA by residents of the parish and responds to PDNPA by giving its view on each application. Council's responses are posted to the PDNPA website for public inspection.

Public Participation: Residents continue to attend council meetings to raise matters of concern directly with Council. We welcome members of the public at both the main council and all committee meetings. Council meetings are generally held at 7:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday. See the parish notice boards (on the side of the Memorial Hall and in the Peace Gardens bus shelter) for meeting announcements and agendas.

BAKEWELL AND EYAM COMMUNITY TRANSPORT Transport for the Community

We would like to thank all our passengers for their very kind comments regarding the Car Scheme Service and the Volunteers. If you need help with transport to medical appointments please contact the Car Scheme on the number below. At the present time we are operating the Car Scheme at Bakewell and Eyam Community Transport with some restrictions, but we are hoping that things will improve with Booster vaccinations and adhering to the present guidelines. We are planning to extend the service offered by the Car Scheme to include social visits to Care Homes and Hospitals, Shopping and Hairdresser appointments when circumstances improve.

Would you like to become a Volunteer for the Scheme? We need more Volunteer Car Drivers to help us to continue to provide this much valued service.

BECT provides accessible transport for rural communities across Derbyshire Dales and the Peak District. Volunteers help individuals who struggle to use conventional transport, perhaps disadvantaged because of age or disability or simply because no scheduled services exist. All you need to be able to help is a little spare time, access to a car and have held a full driving licence for at least three years. There is no need to make a regular commitment, you can help with as little as one journey per month or as much as five per week. The choice is yours and is totally flexible. The rewards of volunteering for the Community Car Scheme are many and include the chance to give something back to your Community and help people live more independent lives, the opportunity to make new friends and participate in social events, and the chance to learn new skills.

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TALES OF (not so) OLD BRADWELL When the Church Clock Stopped

Victor Crabtree was the incumbent at St Barnabas' when the stoppage happened. His time as Vicar ran from 1956 - 1966 and he had trained at Kelham Theological College, Newark-on-Trent, Notts. Victor served curacies at Holy Trinity, Shirebrook, Notts (1943 -1946); St Paul's, Burton on Trent, Staffs (1946 -1950); and was Priest-in-charge at Shirebrook (1950 - 1956). During his incumbency at Bradwell the Aumbrey and Credence Table were presented to the church. Also at the entrance to the churchyard a pair of wrought-iron gates were erected by Walter S. Daniel in memory of James and Elizabeth Daniel and Hilda Hall (1965). A considerable amount of repair work was done to the tower of the church, where much damp and dry rot had been discovered. An anonymous donor gave the Sanctuary Lamp. In August 1966 a Ciborium was presented by the Mother's Union in memory of Joan Alice Crabtree. Mr. Crabtree left Bradwell in 1966 to become Vicar of St Leonard's Church, Shirland, Derbyshire. In the early 1960s Victor wrote in a church Newsletter:

It is pleasing to know that Mr. C. Ashton, one of our P.P.P. members and choirman, is now back at home recovering steadily after an emergency dash into Hospital and a very serious operation. We have missed him in our worship at Church. The Church Clock has missed him too! As many people will know Mr. Ashton has looked after the church clock for some years now, and when he went into hospital it was a question who would look after the Clock. We are grateful to Mr. John Hall for stepping into the breech and then Mr. Donald Ashbury volunteered to help. A little while later the Clock stopped. Let me make it guite clear that these gentlemen are in no way to blame for this. The explanation was simple. A small piece of stone had fallen through a small hole above the clock works, must have bounced on some part and finally landed between the teeth of a cog. Thus when that cog plus chipping met another cog the two refused to work, and so the striking mechanism stopped! The offending chipping was removed but then it was a question of getting the strike to agree with the time and as the expert was ill our assistants naturally did not wish to do anything that might damage the clock. However, the clock was restarted with the striking corrected but it has been running slow. We apologise for any inconvenience which may have been caused and we hope that that the necessary adjustment will soon have made to rectify the fault; but in the mean time please do not blame Mr. J. Hall or Mr. D. Ashbury. They took the job on at short notice and without any detailed knowledge of the workings. We are very grateful indeed to them and thank them most sincerely for their efforts.
