

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Flooding: Following the flooding in the village in October your Parish Council are working with the Derbyshire County Councillor and Derbyshire Dales District Councillor to put pressure on the Environment Agency to conduct a full review on why Bradwell suffered from so much flooding this year. Sincere thanks to all volunteers in the village who helped residents when their homes were being flooded. Thanks also to S & F General Store, who provided their stock of bags of sand, at cost, when councillors were looking for sandbags to protect houses. Can the owners of the houses which were protected by the bags of sand please return them to outside of the toilet block so they can be cleaned and stored for future use. Please do not just leave them at the end of Softwater Lane. Several residents have volunteered to be flood/snow wardens to assist with putting out barriers and sandbags to try and prevent the water getting into houses and to help with snow clearing / gritting activities. More volunteers are needed to help with these tasks in bad weather. Council have set up a WhatsApp group to aid communication when help is needed. If you are interested in joining this team, please contact the Clerk for further details.

Christmas lights: As per last year some residents are hoping to create a display of Christmas lights on trees on Town Bottom playing field, powered by a micro hydro-electric scheme in the Brook. The lights will be low powered and illuminated during the evening for several days at Christmas. Council is also looking to see if some lights can be installed in the trees on Beggars Plot Playing Field.

Change of electricity supplier Town Bottom Playing Field: The supplier of electricity to the toilet block at Town Bottom Playing Field been changed to British Gas Lite. This has saved 22% on unit charges and 24% on the standing charge. S137 Grants: Council has awarded £2,000 to Bradwell Sports Club to help provide better access for disabled and restricted mobility users to the pavilion and £600 to Bradwell Bowls Club towards the costs of repairs to their mowers.

Council Precept 2023/24: Council has begun considering what its precept requirement should be for the coming year. This will be reviewed at the next Finance committee meeting and a decision made at the December parish council meeting. Streetlights: During the darker evenings it is important that all village streetlights are working properly. Faults can be reported to Derbyshire County Council on their website. They require the location or the light number to log the fault. Public Participation: Residents continue to attend council

meetings to raise matters of concern directly with Council. We welcome members of the public at both the main council and all committee meetings. Council meetings are generally held at 7:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday. See parish notice boards (on the side of the Memorial Hall and in the Peace Gardens bus shelter) for meeting announcements and agendas. Contacts:

Continuing our history of Bradwells Ice Cream.

Jane Bownes



Jane joined the business in 1991 and worked in a wide range of different roles throughout the period until 2022 when it became ultimately necessary to close the business. She worked alongside Noel until 2004, joined the board of directors in 1999 and then worked alongside Lawrence until 2020, at which point, as the last business director, she bought the business from Lawrence.

Responsibilities

Some of the responsibilities Jane held during her period of employment included:-

- General Administration (e.g. rent, rates, transport, energy supplies etc.)
- ♦ H.R. covering all aspects of employment (e.g. recruitment, training, retention, payroll, pensions, furlough, redundancy)
- Sales and Marketing to new customers, provision of marketing materials
- ♦ Customer Management including supermarkets
- ♦ Supplier Management working closely with suppliers
- ♦ R&D developing new product lines
- Regulatory systems ensuring compliance with requirements
- ♦ Quality Audit Ensuring Compliance

Marketing

With regard to her country-wide marketing activities, Jane was responsible for:-

- ◆ The provision of point of sale items for retail outlets these included eye catching freezer vinyls for maximum effect / signage / flags / A-boards / labels / menus / cornet holders all of which were costly to design and produce
- The development of the company web site
- ♦ Liaison with distributors e.g. Cumbria, North East, Stratford
- Hosting factory visits by TV reporters, radio reporters and many individual visitors
- Personal appearances to village organisations, on the radio, at charity events and at Bradwell Carnival, pantomime, W.I. and schools.

At the request of the Trafford Centre Jane developed the whole new Platinum range of ice creams in a 6 week period, including all the packaging. An astonishing achievement.

Supplies of Ingredients and other Items

The basic ingredients to make ice cream are milk, butter and sugar and then additional ingredients are added as required for each individual flavour. The milk used at this time was the dried powder form, whilst the 56lb (approx. 25 kg) blocks of butter and the sugar had to be sourced elsewhere. Depending on the required flavour to be made the other ingredients could be, for example, any of six different flavours of ripples, fudge, chocolate, coconut, honeycomb and rum & raisin or even fruits.

Latterly, difficulties arose as suppliers increasingly required a minimum order quantity for items e.g. 25 kg per pack. This condition caused problems when the shelf life of the ingredient was short and the flavour was not a fast moving one. The recipes and the way the ice cream was pasteurised and frozen had not changed for many years but the legislation and required documentation had become extremely stringent. All this was audited during regular visits from the Environmental Health and Trading Standards agencies. (See the Appendix for information about adherence to Health & Safety Regulations and the required quality HACCP & BRC standards). (Also, see the Appendix for information on the Quality Assurance processes demanded by many customers, mainly the large supermarkets). Besides the ingredients for the ice cream itself, many other items were required to be bought, managed and stored. This includes containers for the ice cream (125ml, 1L, 2L, 4L, 4.5 Napoli, and 10L), the labels to identify the flavours contained and the packaging to transport the containers. In 2020, as the economic climate became increasingly difficult, Jane was left with the unenviable task of deciding whether to wind the business up or to fight to survive. In autumn of 2022 she decided to wind the business up and to stop trading. Staff were informed and paid their redundances, customers were informed, suppliers were informed and paid, the manufacturing machinery and remaining ice cream stock was disposed of and all required legal steps completed. A painful process for all involved. To Be Continued.
