CONSIDER THOSE TOADS!



Here is a chance to give wildlife a helping hand in 2025. In March 2024 it was reported on Bradwell's Wildlife and Nature Facebook Group site that toads were being accidentally squashed on Eccles Lane as they migrated across the road to their nearby breeding ponds. In consequence, this Spring we are hoping to set up a **Toad Patrol** to help them safely across the road. Over winter

toads hibernate under piles of logs or stones. They are known for their warty skin, which contains toxins that make them taste unattractive to some predators, such as fish. They are nocturnal and so are most active at night when they hunt for slugs, snails, ants and spiders. Toads walk rather than hop and in Spring migrate back to the ponds where they were born to mate and lay eggs. Toad spawn is produced in long strings which contain a double row of black eggs in a jelly which is wrapped around pond vegetation and can be up to 10 feet long. Born in Barnsley in 1960, Gillian spent her early years in Lytham St Annes, where she was joined by her little sister Liz in 1963. The two were close throughout Gillian's life. The family moved to Sheffield in the early 1970s. Gillian found an aptitude for accountancy, and with her characteristic determination, she became the first female partner in a firm of Chartered Accountants in Sheffield, Gillian and Bruce moved to Bradwell after they married in 1992 and became involved in village life. Gillian

supported and served the church in many capacities. Among other activities she was editor of the parish magazine (forerunner of Bradwell News), but she also organised the Lent lunches and was part of the music team, playing the organ at services. Gillian's deep and steadfast faith sustained her throughout her life. She always made the most of life, with holidays abroad when she was able along with many trips around England and to the Lake District in particular. Gillian lived life to the full and found ways to enjoy life even in the hardest of times. She was a familiar sight bobbing around the village in her much loved Fiat 500. An active member of Rebellion Knoll WI for many years, Gillian was at different times President and then treasurer, and on the programme committee. This was a movement in which she very much believed, and whose motto is "inspiring women". Gillian truly was an inspiring woman.

Gillian passed away on 7th December 2024, surrounded by her family at home.

PC NOTES

New Year Greetings: Happy New Year from your Parish Council. It's been a very cold start to 2025 and the cold weather brings a whole host of problems, particularly on the pavements where slipping is a huge concern, especially for vulnerable residents. Our grateful thanks to the volunteer snow wardens and to anyone who goes out of their way to help keep things clear. We are still in need of volunteers to help, so if you think you could help please get in touch with the clerk. It would be particularly helpful if some of the younger and more able-bodied members of the village could reach out and offer their help. Also, if you do spot a grit bin needing filling please let the clerk know. We are trying our best to keep them filled.

Finance: At a recent finance committee meeting a precept budget for 2025 was set. We are pleased to say that we have been able to continue to control our costs and have managed to continue the trend of previous years by limiting the increase to only 3%. For those who are unsure what this means, the precept is the amount of money we ask Derbyshire Dales District Council for each year to enable us to carry out essential work, repairs and maintenance in the village. This includes maintenance for both playgrounds, the public toilets and other amenities such as benches and bus stops. Council also likes to make sure the place we call home looks smart and appealing, with plants and regular grass cutting of our green spaces. We are very proud of our village and hope that residents are also. For several years now we been working to a rolling five year plan, and in the next few years we are planning to replace and update some of the old and tired playground equipment, look at additional car parking facilities, improve road safety in the village and possibly install more Christmas lights in the trees next December.

External Bodies: Of course, not everything in the village is the responsibility of the Parish Council, but councillors and the clerk are constantly working to forge relationships with other responsible authorities to ensure that problems beyond our control can be reported and resolved quickly and effectively. Again, we ask if you do spot something of concern that you get in contact with the clerk so things can be put right and if the Parish Council can't fix it, we can usually find someone who can.

S137 Grants: After the last newsletter update some more community groups approached us to apply for an S137 grant. We remind residents that there is still some funding left for the current financial year so please get in touch with the clerk if you feel your group or society could benefit from some extra monetary assistance.

Meeting Timetable: The timetable for council meetings for 2025 has been agreed, and it has been decided that there will be meetings every month except for December. Council meetings are always on the first Tuesday of each month but for your reference a list of dates will be posted on the village notice boards. The next meeting will be on February 4th in the Methodist Lounge at 7:30pm, but in the meantime don't forget that the clerk can be contacted on parishclerk@bradda.org or 07730370759.

THE ROMANS ARE COMING by Chris Furness

The romans arrived in Britain in 49 AD. It took them nearly 30 years to fight their way through south Britain and Wales before arriving at the southern border of what was then known as "Brigantia", which comprised most of Yorkshire, north Derbyshire and most of Lancashire. The queen of Brigantia, Cartimandua, was having trouble with her husband, so she invited the romans in to sort him out, which they did. The romans arrived here peacefully, although it was soon clear that they had come for the lead. There would have been much excitement amongst locals at the thought of the coming of the Romans, with all their wealth. Of course, the Romans needed a fort, and the site chosen was on the north bank of the river Noe, which was ideal for



policing the lead mines of Castleton, Bradwell and the Hucklow area. There was also a stream near the west of the site. The fort took its name of Navione (Noe side) from the river on whose north bank it stood. The image here, which shows

what it is thought the fort looked like, is from a painting in the Buxton museum. The legion chosen to man the fort was Spanish, presumably for their knowledge of lead mining. Spain was then the principal country for lead production and lead was very important to the Romans. The first fort was wooden, built using local trees. A service village quickly developed near the fort (recently excavated) providing employment and income for many locals. That fort and village ("vicas") were in existence for more than 60 years until Emperor Hadrian decided the whole legion should march north to help build Hadrian's Wall. The Navione fort was dismantled and buried under clay. Fifty years later, when the Scottish border situation had settled down, the legion marched back to Navione and rebuilt it. but this time in stone. Once again a service village would have developed. This time the fort and village lasted for more than 200 years, until the Romans left Britain for good.

A GHOST STORY OF OLD BRADWELL

We sometimes reproduce stories and articles which have appeared in the Historical Society newsletter or on their website. This story appeared in the Newsletter number 45 and it was written by Mr R. Evans.

Bradwell had its ghosts or 'boggarts' and my mother told me the story of a strange happening, which was vouched for by more than hearsay or tradition. Her brother often went out early on summer mornings into the fields. His way lay by a narrow lane between high walls. Some distance along, projecting stones from one of the walls formed a stile and on the other side (of the stile) lay fields. When he reached the lane he noticed a woman walking ahead of him. He soon gained on her and thought it strange that her feet made no sound, although the way was rough and stony. She mounted the stile before him. He followed, and at the top, as he looked down into the fields he was amazed to find that the woman had vanished. Terror seized him and he leapt back into the lane and fled home, never again to go out alone to those fields in the dim light of dawn when others slept. Mr R Evan's mother also related to her son a variant of the

story of Mrs Buttery of Smalldale (our version appeared in Newsletter 39). In this Mrs Buttery was killed and her body placed in a lime kiln.

He was one of seven siblings and he was closest to his younger brother Mick, with whom he kept in regular touch until David's death. Upon leaving school David worked for the Derwent Valley Water Board, after which he took employment with Blue Circle Cement at Hope works, starting in

the works and then later becoming a lorry driver, a job in which he continued for many years. After redundancy in 1997 he carried on driving for BM Charles out of Hope Works until his retirement in 2008. David moved to Bradwell in 1965 until moving to Dronfield in 2003 with his wife, Nancy. David had three children with his first wife Marion; Chris, Lynn and Teresa. He also had a son, Neil with his second wife Helen. David was also stepfather to Terry and Lisa from his third marriage to Nancy. He had many grandchildren and great grandchildren. He enjoyed his work and was a very social man, spending time in the village pubs with his friends playing darts and dominoes. In later life he liked to spend his time watching sport on TV, with a special interest in formula 1 and darts. He also followed Sheffield Wednesday. David passed away in Chesterfield Hospital and his funeral and burial were in Dronfield on 9th January.
