Council Meeting: There was no parish council meeting in September, but councillors are working on a number of issues. As has been announced elsewhere we can confirm that a device to monitor vehicle speeds was installed at the end of August on Main Road, just past Beggars Plot playing field. Many residents have questioned why this location was chosen and we can say that it was placed there because figures from Speed Watch sessions have shown that a large percentage of speeding occurs at this location. Should funds be available in the future we will consider buying another device. Speed Watch co-ordinator George did identify many sites where a device could potentially be installed but for various reasons these were not approved by Derbyshire County Council. There have also been questions why a speed camera cannot be installed. We've asked for a camera, but the police will only allow one if there are very persuasive reasons, such as fatalities caused by speeding vehicles.

ANPR Cameras: PCSO Will Brockett confirms that the start of the ANPR project for the Hope Valley has been a success. Each parish council in the valley contributed approx. £1,500, so with the three cameras donated by Breedon there are now six cameras covering the valley. Derbyshire constabulary will not tell us where they are, but we are reassured that they are only used for the detection of crime and for any case involving the police such as in missing person cases.

Dredging of the brook: The Environment Agency tell us they are now taking all the required steps to begin the process of desilting sections of the brook, including securing contractors and contacting the landowners. They have confirmed that dredging should be completed before the end of Autumn.

Potholes: From reports, potholes in sections of the village have now been repaired, which is great news. Other reported issues on pavements have also been resolved, so we would like to remind residents to keep reporting these problems on the Derbyshire County Council website or via the clerk who will do it on your behalf.

Youth activities: Bradwell Youth Activities, an organisation which is run, but not funded by the parish council, has been running for many years now. Funding for these activities relies on donations and grants, which this year have come from Breedon, Derbyshire County Council, Derbyshire Dales District and most recently Richard Patton and Greg Rimmer via "The Tour of Bradwell". These grants provide village youngsters with many exciting opportunities for personal development and are very much appreciated. If you feel you might be in a position to offer any kind of sponsorship, whether it be from your business or of a personal nature please contact the clerk, who will be delighted to hear from you.

Volunteers: As we begin to move into the cooler months of the year our thinking starts to shift towards possible snow. We are always looking for volunteers to join our Snow Warden scheme, which provides community help in the form of gritting and clearing pavements or checking on vulnerable residents. BRADWELLSTREET NAMES

Continuing our series of articles on how some of the streets around the village got their names.

3 Bradwell Places and Streets

Cresswell Part Lane - This lane was named after the Cresswell family who built and lived in Smalldale Hall in the 17th Century. "Part" could indicate a division of land or a specific portion of an estate. This could suggest that Cresswell Part Lane was a distinct section



or parcel of land within the larger Bradwell area.

- Dialstone The origin of the name "Dialstone" in Bradwell, Derbyshire, could be traced back to a prominent landmark in the area. A "dialstone" typically refers to a stone pillar or column on which a sundial is mounted. Sundials were used in the past to tell time based on the position of the sun's shadow. The presence of a dialstone in Bradwell suggests that there was likely a sundial erected in the area, serving as a timekeeping device for the local community. Over time, the name "Dialstone" became associated with the location where the sundial stood.
- Eden Tree This area (house, business and land) which stands close to the Roman road of Batham Gate and to the Grey Ditch, is said to be the site of a battle where the Saxon King, Edwin was captured and hung from a nearby tree. The site is referred to in a document of 1570 as 'Edwentrie'.
- Granby Road The Granby family was a prominent English noble family and their name was often used for various locations and landmarks. It is possible that Granby Road in Bradwell was named after the Granby family, either to honour their contributions or because they had a historical connection to the area. The Marquis of Granby is the title of the heir to the Duke of Rutland. A famous Marquis of Granby, Colonel of the Horse Guards led a charge in the seven years war and lost his wig, leading to the expression "to go

at it bald headed". Alternatively, Granby Road could have been named after the Granby estate, which could have been located in or near Bradwell. Estates were often named after the owning family or a significant historical figure associated with the property. This road was the boundary between the Town Field and the Moorfurlongs field (and maybe a third field as well). Granby Road was made into a 14ft wide road by the Enclosure Act of 1823.

- Gore Lane This lane has one of the more striking names in the village and residents have a number of theories as to the name's origin. One theory is that it is named after the local Roman legion's blood-thirsty methods of control, another theory relates to Anglo-Saxon activities (c.f. the Grey Ditch), while a preferred theory is that the name originated from the historic Norman French "Gore" for a triangular shaped piece of cloth or plot of land. Out of interest, the term is used by the modern road and highway construction industry for a triangular plot of land, usually marked off with highway paint, to control traffic when one road forks off from another.

MATLOCK BATH ILLUMINATIONS

It's that time of year again and the Matlock Bath illuminations are in full swing. Every year there is a parade of boats on the River Derwent and this year there were a record breaking 14 boats. The parade is the highlight of the illuminations every Saturday and Sunday through to 26 October. Matlock resident Paul Lil's spectacular peacock-themed boat won him a top prize with his entry called 'Peacock of the Peaks'. Event organisers, Derbyshire Dales District Council have already declared all of the six Illuminations October fireworks finale nights a sell-out, plus Saturday 27th September. Tickets for the remaining available nights can be booked at www.derbyshiredales.gov.uk/illuminations The theme of this year's traditional candle boat, which goes out before the main parade and is constructed by all the boat builders to show how the models used to look a century ago, is 'For the Fallen'. Featuring 80 night lights, it marks the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II and is rowed by Mary Henshall.

District Council Leader, Councillor Steve Flitter said: "Matlock Bath Illuminations are undoubtedly this region's premier autumn event and, 128 years after they were first staged, they continue to play an important role in extending the tourist season by attracting around 100,000 people to the Derbyshire Dales.
