THE BROOK



Residents will have noticed all the activity around the brook, which was the Environment Agency clearing some of the debris from the river bed to help improve water flow and to reduce the risk of flooding during severe rain events. Reaction from residents has ranged from highly satisfied to mildly disappointed, but overall we seem to think that the work has made a significant improvement to what had become a river severely restricted by silt and rubble. But this didn't happen by magic. The Parish Council, supported by many individuals has toiled for years to raise the profile of our brook on the Environment Agency work list. They do have numerous other demands on their resources but finally, supported by our County Councillor and even a village meeting with our Member of Parliament, we have been able to get the work done. On behalf of Bradwell we thank the EA for a job well done.

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
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PC NOTES

As we enter November council's thoughts are turning towards provision of resilience measures to help keep residents safe during the chillier times. The parish council salt bins should now be full of grit, and we have replaced some broken bins. We are looking into areas that may be missing a bin or could do with another, so if you feel your area is lacking in grit provision please tell the clerk so we can assess the situation. There is also a good supply of grit ready for Cllr Harrison, who does a fantastic job of keeping the roads gritted and safe for residents. Brook Dredging: We hope that the recent dredging by the Environment Agency will help if there is a huge downpour. Whilst there have been mixed reactions and comments from residents, this job was not approached lightly, and a balance between desilting and maintaining the biodiversity of the brook had to be considered. For those of you who were observing the work carried out you will have noticed that a large amount of rubble and silt was removed, and it is pleasing to see the family of ducks and their feathered friends have returned to the water. Youth Activities: Council are delighted to announce that the Youth Activities group have been chosen as a recipient of the Co-Op Community fund for the next year. This money will make such a difference to the group because, as we have said before, the group is run by Councillors, but is funded by donations and sponsorship. The youngsters who are benefitting from the group activities would be extremely grateful if any shoppers using the Co-Op chose the scheme to which to donate their dividend. For more information, please contact the clerk. Speed Indicator: The speeding indicator device on Main Road at the junction of Gore Lane has been in place for a month, and the data are interesting. Despite a large amount of residents driving at speeds of 30 mph or lower there are still a high number of vehicles breaking the limit, with recorded speeds of more than 50 mph, which is very worrying. For those who have questioned why the device may show a different speed than your car speedometer, the device is accurate and calibrated correctly. Most car speedometers are slightly inaccurate. This is thought to be a safety measure on vehicles and something our speed watch co-Ordinator George is researching. We are hoping that the data from the device and the work of the speed watch team

BRADWELL STREET NAMES

Continuing our series of articles on how some of the streets around the village might have got their names.

3 Bradwell Places and Streets:

Hall Gate View – This name is intriguing as it raised the question as to which Hall it relates and where that Hall may be. It may well have been a manor house rather than a large hall. The book "Bradwell Ancient and Modern" gives the following information which could well be significant.

The Marshall family were one of the oldest families in the locality and could boast an unbroken descent of over 600 years which included Elias Marshall de Butts in 1399 and Thomas Marshall a churchwarden of Hope in 1750. The principal seat of this distinguished family was at "The Butts" between Bagshaw Cavern and Outlands Head. Here, they had a large hall which was occupied up to 200 years ago but it was converted to farm buildings which were sadly demolished at the start of the twentieth century. The "Hall Barn" premises are located nearby. The Marshall hall could have been widely visible from a great area as Bradwell was devoid of trees until later in the twentieth century.

Hugh Lane – This lane was reputedly named after Mr. Hugh Middleton, possibly sometime during the mid nineteenth century. In the days before streets were surfaced with tarmac and were instead surfaced with stones and chippings, Mr. Middleton took the trouble to maintain the road surface around Yard Head and Hugh Lane, ensuring adequate drainage and filling the many pot holes caused by the heavy carts using the lane. In gratitude for his effort the locals elected, from the various suggestions made, that the lane be named after him. Around 1940 some residents remember this lane being called Yew Lane, presumably after a Yew tree somewhere on the lane, although there is presently no sign of this tree.

Hungry Lane – This lane is shown on the 1807 Plan of Land having Right of Common and was mentioned by name in the 1819 Enclosure Award, although it may have existed before this time. This lane is described as 'an ancient lane' on the 1820 Enclosure Award Schedule. One thought about the origin of the name is that it dates from the fourteenth century when, following a number years of poor climate, disease and famine it became necessary for the starving peasants to cultivate less fertile, less productive 'hungry' land. Other people think that the lane was named because it was used by lead miners returning hungry after their days work.

BAMFORD EVENTS

St John's church in Bamford will be ringing to the sounds of music during November, with two top-notch evenings of folk music. First, on Saturday 8th November at 7.30pm is the acclaimed kora player Josh Doughty, who has been playing the kora, a west African 21-stringed harp, since he was just eight years old. First learning from his father, Adam Doughty, Josh was then invited to study under Malian kora legend Toumani Diabate. Since then he has collaborated with leading musicians from Africa and Europe, including Sampha on his Mercury Prize winning album. In 2018 Josh was voted winner of the World Music Category at the Welsh Harp Festival. Two weeks later, on 22nd November, Irish folk band Whiskey in the Jar play the same venue as part of a series of final farewell concerts, having played together for almost forty years. The four piece band feature fiddle, banjo, whistles and bodhran, as well as guitar and a wide repertoire of great ballads and traditional songs. Support on the night comes from the highly talented Seb Stone, who has been making a name for himself on the folk club circuit and at numerous folk festivals. SPEED CAMERA UPDATE

George Leeson and the speed watch team have been monitoring data provided by the device (SID) because it stores a record of the speed of all passing vehicles, which can be downloaded. First results show that approximately half of all vehicles approaching the village from Brough are breaking the speed limit at that point, and alarmingly the highest speed was 83mph in the early hours of the morning. We are working with the police to see if we can locate the offender.

Tuesday: 6.00pm-7.00pm; Thursday: 3.00pm-5.00pm.




